The 73rd Convention of the CNH District of The Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod

PRE-CONVENTION ACTIVITIES

A gathering of convention delegates and guests was held on Thursday, May 15th, 2025 at St. Mathew Lutheran Church in Rocklin, CA.

The evening's worship service was hosted by St. Matthew with pastors assisting from Sacramento Circuits 4 and 19. Synod President Matthew Harrison offered the message based on the convention theme, "Fruitful Branches – Pruned for Growth."

A dinner featuring barbecued pulled pork preceded the worship service. Many thanks to St. Matthew, the Hospitality Committee, and the Convention Planning Committee for their work.

First Session Friday May 16th, 2025

1. ORIENTATION

District Secretary, Rev. John Standley, welcomed delegates to the convention at 9:00am and offered comments about convention procedures including a review of the Convention's Standing Rules.

The Election Buddy App was used this year for voting. Silas Perez, the Administrative Assistant for the District's Office of Education, offered an overview of the system and helped with log-in instructions. Silas, as well as others, were available throughout the convention to assist the delegates.

2. CONVENTION OPENING

At 10:04 am, President Michael Lange welcomed convention delegates and guests and offered opening remarks based on the convention theme, stating, "Already you are pruned for growth."

Distinguished Synod guests, President Matthew Harrison and Regional Vice-President Scott Murray were introduced, as well as the previous CNH President, Robert Newton. It was noted that former President Walter Tiejen was not able to attend; a video presentation will be shown later during the convention.

Mike introduced his wife, Kristi, with thanks for the love and support she provides for him.

The President continued with introductions of the District Board of Directors, the Convention Planning Committee, and the Audio-Visual team. Special thanks went out to the President's Administrative Assistant, Glenna Sanlis, and to St. Matthew Lutheran Church for their help with the pre-convention activities.

3. OPENING DEVOTION

Reverend Daniel Woo from Hope Lutheran Church in Daly City delivered the convention's opening devotion. Rev. Woo based his words on Psalm 51, verses 1-12. We, like King David, need forgiveness. Like him, we keep silent. Sin separates us from God. Confession allows the process of repentance and forgiveness. "Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow". (ESV)

In Rev. Woo's words, "Confession takes the garbage out." From the Psalm, Pastor Woo shared King David's words, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me. Cast me not away from your presence, and take not your Holy Spirit from me. ¹² Restore to me the joy of your salvation and uphold me with a willing spirit." (ESV). Daniel closed his devotion with prayer.

4. DISTRICT PRESIDENT'S REPORT - PART ONE

President Lange talked about his family's long-time relationship with the Steinbeck's, owners of the Steinbeck Family Vinyards. He spoke of his continued friendship with Cindy and Allen Steinbeck. In preparation for his presentation, Mike worked with Cindy in putting together several video clips taken on location at Steinbeck Vineyards.

Clip #1 – Mike is with Cindy among the grapevines. Cindy talks of the Convention theme, "Fruitful Branches" (John 15:1-3) and how it relates to the vineyard and the Vine Dresser. This setting was the basis for her book, "Father's Vineyard."

Clip #2 – Pruning and grafting make the vine more fruitful. We are the buds that are grafted into the Vine (Root), which is Christ. The root of the grapevine is resistant to disease. The vine is our home. What is it that distracts us from our home? What are the delusions that we run to? Where do we find sustenance? Christ is our Root in which we find sustenance. President Lange stated, "already you will never be closer to Christ than you are in your Baptism".

Clip #3 – God pruned Christ. He was wounded, suffered, and died for our salvation. We too are wounded, dead to self for our salvation. Both were wounded – Christ and us. "He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. By his wounds you have been healed." (1 Pet. 2:24 ESV) We are cut from the old, grafted into the new. Mike noted, "It's never not, when it comes to closeness to Christ."

Clip #4 – Pruning gets us to the best. Pruning helps us produce the best fruit. Pruning takes that which could be good, to allow for that which is the best. Pruning is a process with purpose – Greater Fruitfulness! There are no bad buds. We are pruned to be better and best. In closing, President Lange added, "Let your spiritual toes feel the vineyard floor. Recognize the forgiveness that you are treading upon...the refuge of our pruning journey." God prepares you for fruitful growth.

5. CONVENTION BUSINESS

1. Adoption of the Standing Rules

The Chair asked for a motion to adopt the Convention Standing Rules. A motion was made to adopt the Standing Rules. The motion was seconded. The Convention Standing Rules were approved by a show of hands.

2. Floor Committee Three – Structure

Resolution #3-1 – "To Accept Changes to CNH District Bylaws As Recommended by Synod and District Commissions on Constitutional Matters."

The Chair of Floor Committee Three, Rev. Stewart Crown, presented the Resolve statements of the Resolution. The committee moved to approve the Resolution; the motion was seconded. While the Election Buddy App was being loaded, Secretary Standley asked to speak to the Resolution. Rev. Standley briefly explained the reasons behind the changes as well as the lengthy process that was followed to seek approval of the changes through the Synod Commission on Constitutional Matters and the District Board of Directors.

9. CNH BOARD OF DIRECTORS REPORT

1ST Vice – President Mitch Gowen spoke about the work of the Board of Directors. From his report in the Convention Handbook, the Chairman stated, "For almost 30 years, the California-Nevada-Hawaii District of the LCMS has operated under Policy-

Based Governance. This form of governance differs from the way many churches and organizations are structured by defining the framework for decision-making and operations through setting policies, followed and administered by the District President, rather than actual hands-on administration by the Board of Directors."

"While most Boards are able to point to things like, 'we painted the building, we hired an administrative assistant, we created a new ministry, and we balanced the budget' – the CNH BOD can't say that. Instead, we would say, 'we made sure the vision and resources were available to make sure the building got painted, an administrative assistant was hired, a new ministry was started, and the budget was balanced.' The difference being – the BOD's job is not to do those things – but rather to make sure the District President and staff have a vision, achievable outcomes, and the resources to accomplish it."

11. LCEF REPORT

LCEF Vice President Matt Molinari referred to his full report in the Convention Workbook. Matt talked briefly about the work of LCEF in the CNH District, noting that it is all made possible through investments. He noted that he is working closely with LCEF Real Estate Solutions on several projects in the CNH District.

One of those projects is with Trinity Lutheran Church in Watsonville which will provide housing for farm workers. At the end of his presentation, Matt invited Rev. Joe Robb to come up to lead a prayer for the work at Watsonville.

12. CNH DISABILITY MINISTRY COMMITTEE

President Lange introduced Diane Flynn, who serves as the Chair of the District's Disability Ministry Committee. The committee was authorized by the 2022 Convention.

A video showing some of the activities of the Disability Ministry Committee was viewed by the committee.

13. DISASTER RESPONSE COMMITTEE

The President called for the Chair of the Disaster Response Committee who was not in the Convention Hall, but in the parking lot, showing people the Disaster Response trailer. The trailer is fully stocked with all the material and equipment needed for disaster response. It was noted that the convention was "on the air" by way of Amateur Radio, which is at times during a disaster, the only line of communication. The committee has been very active during the past triennium with fires and storms in our District.

14. CONVENTION BUSINESS

1. Approval of the Agenda

A motion was made to approve the Convention Agenda. The motion was seconded and approved by a show hands.

2. Floor Committee Three -- Structure Resolution # 3-2 -- To Establish a CNH Disaster Response Committee

The Chair of Floor Committee Three, Rev. Stewart Crown, was called forward to present the resolution. Stewart read the body of the resolution and moved the question on behalf of the committee. The motion was seconded. During discussion there was a question concerning the cost to the District. The President advised that the cost has been estimated at no more than a thousand dollars. Hearing no discussion, the vote was taken by Election buddy and approved by 95%.

3. Floor Committee Three -- Structure Resolution #3-3 -- To Consider Recommendations for Circuit #13

Rev. Crown presented the resolution and moved to accept on behalf of the committee. The motion was seconded. Seeing no request for discussion, President Lange sensed that a hand/voice vote would be acceptable. **The Resolution was approved by majority**.

4. Commissioned Ministers Polling

President Lange noted that new Standing Rule #13 allows for a group of our Commissioned Ministers to share their opinion on orders of business as they come to the floor. The results of the polling will be shared before delegate voting takes place.

15. SYNOD PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Lange invited Synod President Matthew Harrison to the podium. President Harrison began by mentioning that the anniversary of the Augsburg Confession was coming soon. He stated that the Augsburg Confession tells us who we are and what we should be as a church. President Harrison offered some historical notes on the Confession. He stated, "Luther's confession is our confession." "We will stand before the judgement seat of Christ." He then worked through the first eleven articles of the Augustana, offering brief commentary on each.

Article One – Who is God?

Article Two – What is Man? What is Sin? – Original Sin.

Article Three – Who is Christ? – We affirm the Ecumenical Councils of the Church.

Article Four – Justification – Saved by Grace, through faith. Declared not guilty!

Article Five – The Preaching Office – How is faith appropriated?

Article Six – We believe in Good Works – God doesn't need our works, our neighbors do.

Article Seven – There is a Church – Ceremonies are not necessary.

Article Eight – Church's Will – What the Church is.

Article Nine – Baptism – Baptism now saves us.

Article Ten – Sacrament of the Altar – Close / Closed / Close(d) – Pastoral Discretion

Article Eleven – Confession – Speak Forgiveness

Matthew went on to say that as followers of Christ, we are not missing anything. We don't need to be anything but what we are.

The President went on to speak of the many activities that are taking place in our Synod:

- National Missions 70 Church Plants now in process. National Missions is "Rockin' and Rollin'", reaching out to Districts asking, "What do you need."
- President Harrison spoke of church plants that are now in progress.
- The Executive position for Black Ministry Council is now the All-Nations Council.
- The Life Ministry Council is a blessing, assisting over 500,000 women, children, and men in crisis pregnancy situations.
- Disaster Response Council is actively working with local congregations. The Council Worked with Pacific Southwest District during the recent fires.
- School Ministries Genesis Project New School Start-ups
- Concordia Plans Investigating the possibility of providing Property Insurance to congregations.
- National Lutheran Ministries Bolivia, Ethiopia, Madagascar, Canada –Working to pull together our global partners – Ordaining three missionaries this week in Rome. We have a Church Plant in Rome!
- Commission on Theology and Church Relations Working on a number of issues including a response to Rome.
- Rosters and Statistics reports that 36% of our members are adult converts. Half
 of our congregations have fewer than 50 people in church on a Sunday. Our
 churches are smaller than they used to be. Dual parishes are the reality of our
 future.
- Information / Situation / Relationship of Texas / Ann Arbor
- Synod Finances Good!

After offering a prayer concerning the tornado damage in St. Louis and Concordia Seminary - St. Louis, President Harrison opened a time for Questions and Answers.

Several questions were brought forward by Delegates and Advisory members.

- Demon Possession in Madagascar
- Alternate Routes to Ordination to allow more men to serve
- Preparing men for Alternate Routes without adding an asterisk (comparison of one route to another)
- Church life expectancy after a certain point according to Rosters and Statistics.
- Has the President sent congratulations to Pope Leo? What does he see as the future relationship with Catholicism?

(Secretary's note – The President's answers were candid and in-depth. As such I do not feel that short of a word for word verbatim, I could accurately do justice to his presentation.)

President Harrison thanked President Lange for his work in our District and Synod and noted that President Lange is well thought of by the Praesidium. In closing, Matthew offered the Benediction. President Lange thanked President Harrison for his presentation and for joining us in Convention.

16. CONVENTION BUSINESS

1. In Memoriam

A video was shown In Memory of the CNH District church workers who were called to be with their Lord Jesus during this past Triennium. The video featured pictures and information on each worker.

2. Floor Committee One - Mission Within the District

Resolution #1-1 – "To Implement a Stronger Process for the Participation of Commissioned Ministers at future CNH District Conventions"

Rev. Alan Sommer was introduced as Chair of Floor Committee #1. Alan noted that the Floor Committees may have changed some of the wording in the Overtures from what was in the Workbook. He directed the delegates to the District Website for the updated Overtures. Alan asked Danika Neal, Commissioned Minister and member of the Floor Committee, to introduce the Resolution, reading both the Whereas statements as well as the Resolves.

The Committee moved to adopt the Resolution. The motion was seconded. The Chair opened the floor for discussion. <u>There was a "friendly amendment" offered to change the word "counted" in line 18 to "binding".</u> The amendment was accepted.

After further discussion, there was an amendment to strike all words in lines 12-15 beginning with the word "along" in line 12, and ending with the word, "conventions" in line 15. The amendment was moved and seconded. There was concern raised that there are other Advisory members that are not included in this Resolution. The Chair suggested that this should be considered further at another time.

There was no discussion on the amendment. Polling of the Commissioned Ministers was positive. The amendment to the Resolution was approved by a hand/voice vote.

Moving to the main motion and hearing no further discussion, the chair called for the vote on the resolution as amended. <u>The resolution passed with 83% of the votes cast.</u>

17. DISTRICT PRESIDENTS REPORT - PART TWO

President Lange stated that part two of the President's report would begin with messages from staff. A video was shown featuring some of the activities of the CNH Mission Agency.

Following the video, President Lange introduced the Executive Director of LINC – Bay Area, Aaron Putnam. Pastor Putnam talked about the activities of LINC – Bay Area. He stated that their mission is to "raise up leaders where they serve." Aaron showed photos on the screen of several of these local missionaries that are currently working in local mission fields.

Joel Wahlers serves as the Assistant to the President for Education. Joel talked about the schools in the CNH District. He offered several statistics that can be found in his report in the Convention Workbook. Joel says that adequate staffing continues to be a major challenge, this is especially true for rostered staff. Joel shared a video featuring CNH school staff that came out of District Schools. He stressed that the way to help with the teacher shortage is to raise up students within our congregations to pursue one of the many ways available to become a Lutheran School Educator.

Joel offered background material regarding the District's Strategic Ministry Plan (SMP) that was passed at the 2022 District Convention. Joel worked through the components that make up the SMP. These are Mission, Vision, Values, Goals, and Strategic Initiatives. Together, Joel and the President went on to share some examples of how these components work together to serve the District.

President Lange followed by saying, "Where do we go from here." He then offered this Mission Statement --- "We strengthen God's people to serve and bear witness to Christ." Mike went on to lay out a path forward to bring that Mission Statement to life. This includes raising up leaders, supporting individual congregation's visions, working with Real Estate Solutions, and seeing congregations partnering together to enhance their ministries.

18. CONVENTION BUSINESS

1. Floor Committee Two – Mission and Action Beyond

Resolution #2.1 -- To Strengthen the Nonvoting Advisory Role of Commissioned Ministers at Synodical Conventions

The Chair of Floor Committee Two, Rev. Brian Cummins, introduced the Resolution by reading the Resolves. The committee offered the motion which was seconded. The Convention Chair opened the floor for discussion.

A friendly amendment was offered to strike wording in line 10 beginning with the words "along with" and all words to the semi-colon in line 13. The committee accepted the change.

The Commissioned Ministers poll was taken with 100% agreeing to the Resolution as amended. The vote was taken on the resolution as amended. The result was 82.6% in favor.

2. Resolution #2.2 -- To Support and Clarify the Prior Approval Process

Rev. Brian Cummins introduced the Resolution by reading the last Whereas and the Resolves. The Resolution was moved by the Committee and received a second. The Convention Chair opened discussion.

President Harrison spoke against the Resolution. <u>There were several friendly amendments requesting grammar changes.</u> The Chair suggested that this would all be corrected in the final draft. Rev. Andrew Jones stated that the Resolution was essentially seeking greater transparency in the process.

The polling of our Commissioned Ministers indicated approval. <u>The Resolution was approved with 85%.</u>

19. FRIDAY'S CLOSING DEVOTION

Rev. Berhanu Didanu, Executive Director and Co-Founder of Mercy Holistic Ministry, offered today's closing devotion.

Pastor Berhanu's remarks were based on Psalm 107 verses 1-9. He noted that Mercy Holistic Ministry speaks to the needs mentioned in verse 9 of the Psalm – "For he satisfies the longing soul, and the hungry soul he fills with good things". (ESV)

Mercy Holistic Ministry seeks to offer the "good things," both spiritual and material. "God fills and satisfies us, so that we can fill and satisfy others." Rev. Didanu closed with prayer.

20. REGIONAL CAUCUS

Convention Delegates were released to their Regional Caucus to participate in the nominations of their Regional Vice-Presidents and Lay Directors. Both slates will be presented to the Convention tomorrow for election.

21. FRIDAY EVENING ACTIVITIES

Delegates and guests gathered for a time of fellowship followed by the Banquet.

5. Floor Committee One – Mission Within the District

Resolution #1-6 – "Affirming the CNH District's Strategic Ministry Plan and Executive Summary Direction for the 2025–2028 Triennium"

Floor Committee One Chair, Alan Sommer, came to the podium to introduce the Resolution. Alan read the final Whereas and the Resolves. The Committee moved the Resolution for approval. The motion was seconded. President Lange called for discussion; hearing none, he called for the polling of the Commissioned Ministers which was in favor of the motion. The Chair received permission to use a hand / voice vote. **The Resolution was approved.**

6. Resolution #1-5 -- To Encouraging Ministry Sabbaticals to Church Workers and Ministries

Committee Chair, Alan Sommer, read the Whereas statements as well as the Resolves. The Committee moved the Resolution for adoption. The motion was seconded. President Lange called for discussion; hearing none, he called for the polling of the Commissioned Ministers, which was in favor of the motion. The Chair asked for and received permission to use a hand/voice vote. **The Resolution was approved.**

7. Resolution #1-4 -- To Establish a Stronger Framework for Connection and Collaboration Between Regional Vice Presidents (RVPs), Circuit Visitors (CVs), and Congregations in the CNH District

Rev. Sommer read the Whereas statements and Resolves. The Committee moved the Resolution for adoption. The motion was seconded. President Lange called for discussion. Mike spoke to the rationale for the Resolution. There was a question regarding the need for the resolution. The President responded that it was a way to offer direction to the Board. It would allow prospective candidates for office to know what they can expect if elected.

President Lange called for the polling of Commissioned Ministers. The poll indicated that they were in favor of adoption. Once again, the Convention Chair asked if this was something that could be accomplished by a hand/voice vote, the assembly agreed. **The Resolution was approved.**

8. Resolution #1-2 -- To Live Responsibly in God's Creation

Committee Chair Alan Sommer read the Whereas statements as well as the Resolves. The Committee moved the Resolution for adoption. The motion was seconded.

President Lange asked to remove the words in line 25, "try to develop resource materials," and to replace them with, "to identify resources." There was also a friendly amendment to add a scripture reference (Micah 6.8) on line #15 after the words "God's word."

There were comments made concerning the depth of and reason for the Resolution. Rev. Stan Abraham spoke in favor of the Resolution.

Rev. Eric Van Sharrel called for the question to end debate. President Lange advised that the motion to end debate would require a 2/3 majority vote. The vote was taken by a raise of hands. The result was a clear indication to end discussion and move to the vote.

President Lange moved to the main motion. The polling of our Commissioned Ministers resulted in a 63% no vote on the main motion. The response of the Voting delegates resulted in a 62.8% no vote on the main motion. The motion was defeated.

6. CONVENTION ESSAYIST

Jeff Cloeter is the Senior Pastor of Christ Memorial Lutheran Church in St. Louis, Missouri. Jeff is the author of "Loved & Sent" and blogs at <u>sixthgen.com</u>. He is married to Bobbi and father to Bella, Joshua, Emily, and Jacob.

Rev. Cloeter began by noting that things have changed; the last five years have been different. He said, "We face a unique time that requires us to flex 'new muscles,' or old muscles that must be flexed to new degrees." He continued with the introduction of those muscles:

#1 Relational Muscle – Jeff used a quote that he heard from Young Life Student Ministry. The quote states, "You have to earn the right to be heard." Along with that, he offered Acts 2:46-47 – "And day by day, attending the temple together and breaking bread in their homes, they received their food with glad and generous hearts, ⁴⁷ praising God and having favor with all the people. And the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved" (ESV). Titles, like Reverend, don't carry the weight they once did. Today the shift has gone from positional authority to relational authority. "Earn the right to be heard."

#2 Collaborative Muscle – Rev. Cloeter stated, "I believe that the future of the Church is multi-congregational." In times past, congregations could "compare and compete." Lutherans would move from one church to another. Jeff noted that that time is past – "we're on the same team." The future of the church needs a "collaborative muscle."

""And the glory which Thou hast given Me I have given to them; that they may be one, just as We are one; ²³ I in them, and Thou in Me, that they may be perfected in unity, (John 17:22-3 NAS)

"What is the first step you can take to collaborate?"

- **#3 Apprenticeship Muscle –** The question we must ask is, who is next? There is an old saying, "I can do the work of ten people, or I can train ten people to do the work." Apprenticeship is intentional, it is an investment.
- **#4 Naming Muscle –** "We must hone the ability to name reality accurately." We love to live in days past. "I remember when the church was full, I remember ---". There is comfort in the good ol' days. Things have changed; they're not like they used to be. Today is where we live, we need to be able to name it rather than deny it. Rev. Cloeter asked, "Can you name the reality?" "Can you develop a response?"
- **#5 Sacrificial Muscle** *John Daly, the Golfer said, "That's why I never get injured. You can pull a muscle, but you can't pull fat."* Western Christianity had priority and influence in society. It is easy to become lax, spoiled. Our Lord invites us, *"take up your cross and follow me."* Dietrich Bonhoffer said, *"When God calls a man, he bids him to come and die."* Sacrificial love is the most powerful witness. The church is strongest when she sacrifices the most. "What are you willing to sacrifice?"
- **#6. Pentecostal Muscle** It tells us to Pray before Planning. It means Spirit over strategy. Psalm 85 the psalmist prays, "Revive us again, O Lord of our salvation." This is the Pentecostal Muscle. Rev. Cloeter noted that we are at a critical moment in the history of the church a time of seismic change. Our muscles only have meaning when connected to the head, which is Jesus Christ. He is perfectly suited for this age.

Following his presentation, there was a time of question and answer.

7. CONVENTION BUSINESS

1. Video Orphan Grain Train

President Lange noted the work of the Orphan Grain Train within the CNH District. A video was presented from Orphan Grain Train highlighting their activities in our District and throughout the Synod.

2. Introduction of Pastors new to our District during this past Triennium

The names and assignments of pastors that came into to the District during this past triennium were read by President Lange and acknowledged by assembly.

3. Floor Committee One – Mission Within the District Resolution #1-3 -- To Promote Lives of Christian Service

Committee Chair, Rev. Alan Sommer, introduced Resolution #1-3 reading both the Whereas statement and the Resolves. The committee moved for the adoption of the Resolution. The motion was seconded. President Lange called for discussion.

There was a <u>friendly amendment to change the word "develop" to "utilize</u>" in line #27. The change was accepted. <u>There was a second amendment to change the word</u> "fairness" in line #20 to "mercy". The Convention Chair called for a vote on the change

due to the difference in meaning between the two words. The motion was accepted by a hand/voice vote.

The poll of the main motion by our Commissioned Minister showed 87% approval. **The vote on the motion as amended was approved by 67.5%.**

The assembly offered their appreciation for the work of the Floor Committees.

4. Installation of the District President

Preceding the Order of Installation of the District President, the Hymn "Go My Children" was sung by the assembly.

After the hymn, Synod President, Rev. Dr. Matthew Harrison installed Rev. Michael Lange as the President of the CNH District of The Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod for his third term.

Since the 2013 Convention, appointments to theological faculties at all universities and seminaries, as well as all college, university, and seminary presidential appointments, have been subject to the prior approval process. While the convention in 2013 amended the bylaws to delegate the responsibility for prior approval to specific groups (see bylaws referenced below) the bylaws did not, and still do not, stipulate how the process of prior approval should be carried out. Over time this has led to questions as to the standards used to evaluate candidates as well as the process utilized by the prior approval panels. In the hopes of building trust and relieving any undue criticism of the panels and the process, the following overture aims to increase transparency for the process and standards used by the panels as well as ensuring clear communication between the panels, the candidates, and the Synod.

Resolution

ARTICLE I MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District is to challenge and assist congregations in their proclamation of the Gospel and ministry to all people.

ARTICLE II RELATIONSHIP TO THE SYNOD

The Constitution of the Synod is also the constitution of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District. The Bylaws of the Synod shall be primarily the bylaws of the District. Both the Bylaws of the Synod and those of the District serve the Gospel mission and ministry of the Lord.

ARTICLE III STRUCTURE OF THE DISTRICT

III.A. The Board of Directors

1. The District Board of Directors shall be comprised of 12 members: The First Vice President of the District, who shall serve as Chair of the Board, five Regional Vice Presidents, five Regional Directors, and one Director-Commissioned Minister. The Board will conduct regular meetings at least quarterly. The Board may also meet at other times for purposes consistent with the Bylaws at the call of the District President, the First Vice President, or any five members of the Board of Directors. Seven members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum. In the event of the absence of the First Vice President, the quorum present shall elect a regional Vice President to next available Regional Vice President in the order of Succession shall serve as Chair Pro Tem. (The District President, the District Secretary, and the District Treasurer shall attend all regular meetings of the Board of Directors.)

- 2. Subject to limitations set forth in the Articles of Incorporation, these Bylaws, the Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod, and the statutes of the states in which the District operates, with regard to which the District intends to retain all authority and autonomy allowed a church under the laws and Constitution of the United States and the states in which the District operates. Aall operates, all corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of the Board of Directors.
- 43 3. The District Board of Directors shall:

a. As a primary function, generate and adopt declarations of desired outcomes which will give longterm direction to the District and its President, staff, and committees.

- b. In addition to generating and adopting declarations of desired outcomes, address broad levels of issues in policies of purpose and governance or constraints, leaving lesser levels to the discretion of the District President.
- c. Through the District President, and he through his staff and the District Committees, coordinate the work of the District in accordance with the District Mission Statement, the Bylaws of the Synod, the Bylaws of the District, the District Convention Resolutions, and the declarations of desired outcomes.
- d. Except for assignments of its own work (policies) to committees, consultants, or officers, delegate authority only to the District President.
- e. Provide for an annual audit of the records of the District in such manner directed by the Synod and in accordance with its own policies.
- f. Provide for and oversee the bonding of all District fiscal officers and employees entrusted with the receiving and disbursing of funds, such bonds to be provided by a licensed bonding agency at District expense.
- g. Be empowered to review all activities of the District and its committees, and make binding decisions affecting them; this review may include, but is not limited to, the leadership, membership, purpose, or functions of any activity or Committee.
- h. Approve or disapprove the annual District Budget which the District President shall present.
- i. Be the authority to create and abolish Called positions and act as the Calling body on behalf of the District. The administrative details, including preparation of Call documents, may be delegated to the District President.
- j. Respond in a timely manner to any formal concern related to the Board's area of responsibility addressed to it by the President, Board members, committees authorized by the Bylaws or the Board, Circuit Forums, Circuit Pastors' Conferences, or Congregations of the District or organizations that are ancillary to the District or Synod..
- k. Appoint District Reconcilers as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.
- 1. Be the custodian of all property, records, and legacies of the District.
- m. Establish and provide for the maintenance of a headquarters called the District Office, which shall be the official address of the District. All official records of the District shall be kept at the District Office; any exceptions shall require approval of the Board of Directors.
- n. Present reports of its actions at all District Conventions and, if desired, propose recommendations for consideration by the District Convention.
- o. Be responsible to the District for its actions and the actions of all District Officers, Committees, agents, and employees.
- 4. Members of the Board of Directors shall not serve as Chairs of District Committees; nor serve as members of the Nominating Committee; nor be on the District payroll.

III.B. The District President

1. The District President shall be Chief Executive of the District.

2. The District President shall:

a. Be a Minister of Religion – Ordained and be on the roster of the Synod. He must be a member of the District during his tenure.

b. Be a member of the District during his tenure.

c. Be a full-time executive.

d. Perform the duties and functions of office as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.

e. Provide vision and direction for the work of the District, and, in compliance with the policies of the Board of Directors, be the overseer of the work of the District.

f. In consultation with the Board of Directors, appoint all District Committee Chairs, who shall be directly responsible to the President.

g. In consultation with each duly appointed Committee Chair, appoint a sufficient number of members to each Committee to ensure its proper functioning (except for the members of the Nominating Committee, which are elected by the District Convention, as required by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws).

h. Be responsible for the proper functioning of all District Committees.

i. In consultation with other staff professionals and Committee Chairs, and in compliance with the fiscal limitations established by the Board of Directors, be responsible for the preparation of the annual District Budget.

j. In consultation with the District Board of Directors, contract for service sufficient professional staff personnel to assist the Committees in the performance of their tasks, such contracts to be time limited and coterminous with each term of office of the District President and such personnel to report directly to the President, who shall be responsible for their proper functioning.

k. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors: to provide reports summarizing his activities; to report his perceptions of the progress of District programs; and to receive counsel from the Board.

1. Perform the duties and functions of office as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.

III.C. District Vice Presidents

1. The First Vice President shall:

b. Upon the request of the President, or as directed by the District Convention, advise, assist, or represent the President.

c. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors.

a. Be a minister of Religion – Ordained and be on the roster of the District.

d. Serve as Chair of the Board of Directors.

2. The Regional Vice Presidents shall:

a. Be ministers of Religion – Ordained, be on the Roster of the District, and have membership in a congregation of their represented region throughout their service.

b. Upon the request of the President, or as directed by the District Convention, advise, assist or represent the President.

c. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors.

d. Be selected regionally, by caucus, at the regular Convention for no more than two consecutive terms, with the slate presented for possible amendment and final ratification by the District Convention.

e. Not be ranked. Hold a position in the order of succession to the presidency as established by majority vote of the Conventions of the District.

f. Attend at least one meeting of each Circuit Forum in his region each year: to provide reports summarizing his activities and those of the Board of Directors; to report his perceptions of the progress of District programs; and to receive counsel from the Circuit Forum.

III.D. The Regional Directors

The Regional Directors shall: a. Be lay persons.

b. Be members of District congregations and have membership in a congregation of their represented region throughout their service.

c. Be selected regionally, by caucus, at the regular Convention for no more than two consecutive terms, with the slate presented for possible amendment and final ratification by the District Convention.

d. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors.

c. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors.

e. Attend at least one meeting of each circuit Forum in his/her region each year: to provide reports summarizing his/her activities and those of the Board of Directors; to report his/her perceptions of the progress of District programs; and to receive counsel from the Circuit Forum.

III.E. Director-Commissioned Minister

The Director-Commissioned Minister shall:

 a. Be a minister of Religion – Commissioned and be on the roster of the District.

 b. Be elected at the regular Convention.

d. Attend at least one District Educators Conference each year: to provide reports summarizing his/her activities and those of the Board of Directors; to report his/her perceptions of the progress of District programs; and to receive counsel from the Educator's Conference.

III.F. The District Secretary

The District Secretary shall:

a. Be a minister of Religion – Ordained and be on the roster of the District.

b. Perform all customary duties required and expected of a Corporate Secretary.

c. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors, record all proceedings, and within fourteen days publish minutes of the proceedings to all members of the Board of Directors, all District Officers, all Committee Chairs, all Parish Pastors, and all Congregational Presidents of the District. Executive session proceedings shall not be recorded nor minutes taken Minutes of Executive Session proceedings shall not be taken.

d. Arrange for the preparation and publication of *The Convention Manual Workbook* and for its distribution to all professional workers and congregations on the District roster and all designated delegates at least 30 days before the opening of the District Convention.

e. Attend the District Convention and record all take minutes of its proceedings (assistants being appointed by the President as necessary) and by July 1 following the District Convention publish the *Proceedings of the District Convention* and arrange for its distribution to all professional workers and congregations on the District roster, and all designated delegates.

f. In consultation with the District's Committee on Constitutional Matters, publish revisions of the District Bylaws as needed and arrange for their distribution to all professional workers and congregations on the District roster.

g. Perform such other duties as the president or the Board of Directors may assign.

III.G. District Treasurer

a. Be a lay person.

The Treasurer shall:

b. Be a member of a District congregation.

c. Administer the office in accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by the District Board of Directors.

d. Ensure that the District President keeps an accurate account of and disburses District funds according to instructions of the Board of Directors.

e. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors to monitor the financial health of the District and to provide counsel to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV THE DISTRICT COMMITTEES

IV.A. In General

3. Although Committee Chairs answer directly to the District President, they attend Board of Directors meetings to report and to give and receive counsel.

IV.C. Mandated Committees

1. MISSION

 a. This Committee is responsible for coordinating and promoting the mission plans of the District and supporting and encouraging the mission work of every congregation.

b. This Committee shall operate according to the CNH District Mission Agency policies and procedures as adopted by the Board of Directors.

 c. This Committee' shall coordinate with the Office of National Mission and, if applicable, the Office of International Mission. This committee shall provide liaison for the Synod's Board for National Mission as well as coordination with the Office of National Mission. If applicable, this Committee will also work together with the Board for International Mission.

2. HUMAN CARE MINISTRIES

a. The Chair of this Committee may attend all regular meetings of the Board of Directors and any special meetings, or when required by the District President or the Board of Directors.

 - iii. Promote activities that stimulate historical interest and awareness in the District.
 - iv. Advise congregations and agencies in establishing and maintaining their own archives.

6. NOMINATING COMMITTEE

- a. The Chair of this Committee may attend any regular meeting of the Board of Directors and shall attend any special meeting of the Board of Directors, or when required by the District President or the Board of Directors.
- b. This Committee shall:
- i. Be elected as part of each Convention's elections process, as prescribed in required by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.
- ii. Consist of one Minister of Religion-Ordained, one Minister of Religion-Commissioned, and two lay persons.

ARTICLE V DISTRICT CONVENTIONS

The District shall meet in Convention triennially prior to June 1 of the year preceding the Convention of the Synod. Adjustments to the timing of the Convention may be needed due to extreme cases. Any Change would be determined by the District President in consultation and agreement with the District Board of Directors. In addition to provisions of the Synod Constitution and Bylaws regarding Conventions of the District, the following regulations shall apply:

V.A. Delegates

Congregations shall register the names (together with a brief biographical sketch) of the delegates and alternates with the District President at least three months prior to the opening of the Convention.

V.B. Committee Appointments

The District President shall announce the appointment of Convention Floor Committees in the pages of the official District publication at least one month prior to the opening of the Convention.

V.C. Convention Manual Workbook

Reports from The District Board of Directors, Circuits, and all Committees of the District, as well as others desiring to bring their work to the attention of the District Convention, shall submit their reports and recommendations be submitted to the District President for publication in the Convention Manual

- 1. Election of the President
 - a. In the first business of the session of the Convention, the Teller Committee shall conduct the election for the office of President.
 - b. Each voting delegate shall be entitled to vote for one of the candidates for President, whose names appear on the slate published by the District Secretary.
 - c. The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared President.
 - a. If additional balloting is necessary, the candidate receiving the smallest number of votes shall be eliminated on each subsequent ballot until one candidate receives a majority of the votes cast. In the event of ties for the smallest number, all those tied shall be eliminated.
- 3. Election of the First Vice President
- a. In the first business session of the Convention, the Teller Committee shall conduct the election for the office of First Vice President.
 - b. Each voting delegate shall be entitled to vote for one of the candidates for First Vice President, whose names appear on the slate published by the District Secretary.
 - c. The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared First Vice President.
 - d. If additional balloting is necessary, the candidate receiving the smallest number of votes shall be eliminated on each subsequent ballot until one candidate receives a majority of the votes cast. In the event of ties for the smallest number, all those tied shall be eliminated.
 - 4. Election of the Regional Vice Presidents and Regional Directors
 - a. The Regions shall caucus to nominate their Regional Vice Presidents and the Regional Director. Each Region will submit to the Convention one nomination for Regional Vice President and one nomination for Regional Director.
 - b. In the Regional caucus, the Teller Committee will facilitate the nomination of the Regional Vice President as follows:

c. Nominations from credentialed Lay and Pastoral delegates from the Region are accepted from the floor of the Caucus. All those nominated and have agreed to serve will comprise the slate. Nominees will be allowed to make a brief introductory statement.

d. If no one has received a majority on the first ballot

- e. In the Regional caucus, the Teller Committee will present the slate prepared by the Nominating Committee for the office of Regional Director; entertain nominations from the floor of the caucus as allowed in Article *VI.D* above. Upon closure of the slate, the caucus shall by ballot select its candidate. The Candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared nominated.
- f. The Teller Committee shall submit to the Convention a final slate of candidates for the offices of Regional Vice President and Regional Director to be ratified by the Convention. <u>As prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws</u>, the Convention as a whole retains the right to amend the slate by majority vote.
- g. The Teller Committee shall conduct the election (ratification) of the Regional Vice Presidents and Regional Directors.
- 5. Succeeding elections shall be conducted by the Teller Committee for the following offices:
 - a. For the Director-Commissioned Minister, for the Secretary, and for the Treasurer from the slate prepared by the Nominating Committee, supplemented by nominations from the floor. The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected.
 - b. For the (next Convention) Nominating Committee from the slate prepared by the Nominating Committee, supplemented by nominations from the floor. The candidates receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected.
 - c. For Circuit Visitors from the slate published by the District Secretary. As prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws, the Convention as a whole retains the right to amend the slate by majority vote. as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.
 - d. <u>The teller shall conduct the election by majority for each position to determine the Order of Succession of the Regional Vice Presidents 2-6.</u>

VI.G. Ballots

On all ballots, candidates shall be listed in alphabetical order. There shall be no indication of incumbency by special mark.

VI.H Records of Elections

All ballots in each election shall be preserved by the Chair of the Teller Committee until the close of the Convention and shall then be destroyed, as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.

VI.I Procedures and Methods

The committee shall be empowered to adopt procedures and methods that will ensure efficiency and accuracy, including the use of mechanical, electronic, or other methods of casting, recording, or tabulating votes.

VI.J. Vacancies

1. When the Office of President becomes vacant, or when should the President is becomes permanently incapacitated, the Office shall be assumed by the First Vice President. If less than six months of the term remains, he may serve out the term in a part-time capacity. If more than six months remains, he must be willing to assume the position full-time. If he declines, a new President shall be elected by the Board of Directors the next Regional Vice President in the order of Succession established by the Convention will assume the office of the President.

2. Whether the President is unable to serve because of prolonged illness or disability and whether his incapacity is temporary or permanent shall be determined by the Board of Directors, If it is deemed by the Board that the situation is temporary, the First Vice President shall immediately assume the duties of the office of the President.

- 3. Should the office of First Vice President becomes vacant, a new First Vice President shall be elected by the Board of Directors. the position shall be filled by following the of Regional Vice Presidents order of succession as established by majority vote of the District in Convention. The newly appointed Regional Vice President who fills the resulting vacancy will assume the last position in the order of succession.
- 4. Vacancies in any other elected office of the District shall be filled by Presidential appointment by and with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors. In the event any officer of the District shall become incapable of service, it will be the duty of the Board to determine whether the situation is likely permanent or temporary. According to their determination, the Board will take the appropriate action concerning that person's service. the Board of Directors shall relieve that person of his/her duties.

VI.K. Delegates to the Synod Convention

1. Election of the delegates and alternates (voting) shall be as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.

2. Election of advisory delegates and alternates in the categories of Minister of Religion – Ordained and of Minister of Religion – Commissioned shall be as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.

3. Selection of other District advisory representatives shall be as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.

4. Selection of the District's youth representatives shall be made by a District Youth Task Force.

VI.L Installation of Officers

 1. All District officers elected at the Convention shall be installed on July 1 following the Convention, or as soon thereafter as practicable. The President shall designate the installing officer and the date, time, and place of the installation.

2. The President and other District Officers leaving office shall continue to hold the authority and responsibility of office until July 1 following the Convention. The incoming President and other District Officers shall assume office on July 1 following the Convention.

3. Any expenses of the newly elected officers related to assuming office shall be the responsibility of the District.

699 ARTICLE VII

REGIONS, CIRCUITS AND CIRCUIT FORUMS

- 1. The authority to determine Regional and Circuit divisions shall rest with the District Convention, as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.

2. The purpose and function of each Circuit and Circuit Forum shall be as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.

3. Within two months after each District Convention, each Circuit Forum shall meet and elect such officers as it deems necessary to support the Circuit Visitor who was elected by the District Convention.

4. Each congregation or multi-congregation parish shall be represented at the Circuit Forum at least by the pastor and one member designated by the congregation, as prescribed the Synod Constitution and Bylaws

Each Circuit Forum may submit overtures to the District Board of Directors as well as to Synod and District Conventions, as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws.

ARTICLE VIII AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS

VIII.A. Amendments by Direct Convention Action

Amendments to these Bylaws may be made by the District Convention provided:

a. The change is not contrary to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod.

b. The proposed change is presented to the Convention in writing.

c. The proposed material is specified as a Bylaw amendment and is studied as such by a Convention floor committee.

d. The change is adopted by a majority vote by the Convention.

e. Changes proposed by the District are reviewed and approved in advance by the Synod's Commission on Constitutional Matters (CCM). <u>Further changes made without CCM approval will take effect only after such approval</u>.

VIII.B. Amendment by Indirect Convention Action

1. Amendments to these Bylaws shall be made when the District Convention shall have created new entities without having established Bylaw provisions for them or when District Convention action affecting these Bylaws has been taken without providing the necessary new texts.

2. Needed revisions to these Bylaws shall be drafted by the District Constitutional Matters Committee and submitted to the next District Convention for approval, after first being reviewed and approved in advance by the Synod's CCM. Further changes made without CCM approval will take effect only after such approval.

3. <u>In exceptional circumstances and upon the express direction of a convention of the District or of the Synod, amendments may be made by a two-thirds majority of the Board of Directors.</u>

(a) Such amendments to the Bylaws shall be necessary to implement resolutions adopted by a convention of the District, or of the Synod.

(b) Such amendments shall be drafted by the District CCM and shall be approved by the Synod's Commission on Constitutional Matter.

VIII.C. Amendment by Synod Action.

When necessitated by amendments to the Synod Constitution or Bylaws or otherwise expressly directed by a resolution of the Synod in convention, amendments may be made by a two-thirds majority of the District Board of Directors. Such amendments shall be drafted by the District Secretary and shall be reviewed in advance by the LCMS Commission on Constitutional Matters.

VIII.D. Publication of Bylaw Revisions

Whenever it becomes necessary to publish new editions of the Bylaws of the District (whether entirely or in substantial sections), the Secretary shall have responsibility for their publication.
