in each Circuit before the 2025 CNH District Convention.

To Increase the number of students preparing for General Ordination by expanding the work of the Cross-cultural Ministry Center - CUI(CMC).

WHEREAS, God has greatly blessed the congregations of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and our global partner church bodies since 1839 with pastors educated and shaped by our wonderful Seminaries; and

WHEREAS, the seminaries of the LCMS are currently offering, beyond the residential Master of Divinity program, a variety of routes for pastoral formation which take into consideration the needs, desires, and context of the students, including the Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Thecogy (EIIT), Center for Hispanic Studies (CHS), Specific Ministry Pastors (SMP), SMP to General Pastor Certification (typically an 8 year program), the Residential Alternative Route, and the Cross-cultural Ministry Center (at CUI); and

WHEREAS, the congregations of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District – LCMS acknowledge that there is a growing need for well trained, general ordination pastors who are able to receive divine calls from congregations without restriction, provide supervision for other rostered church workers, supervise vicars, hold elected or appointed office on the district or national Synod level such as a Circuit Visitor, and vote as delegates at the Synodical conventions of the church; and

WHEREAS, pastors of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod are retiring in larger numbers than ever before and the number of men graduating from our seminaries is less than what is needed to replace these faithful servants and expand further mission and ministry; and

WHEREAS, most students in today's world of education expect that they will be afforded the opportunity to learn in a variety of educational methods (pedagogy) which include both online as well as in-person instruction; and

WHEREAS, Concordia Seminary St. Louis and Concordia Theological Seminary Ft. Wayne provide only residential, in-person, instruction for the general ordination route of the Master of Divinity; and

WHEREAS, it has become increasingly difficult and prohibitive for prospective LCMS seminary students to leave homes, family, employment, and ministry context to move cross-country to enroll in a four-year residential Master of Divinity program; and

WHEREAS, the Cross-cultural Ministry Center at Concordia University Irvine has, for 27 years, faithfully offered the only Master's-level degree in the LCMS with a hybrid model of online and

in-person education leading to general ordination with certification through Concordia Seminary St. Louis; and

WHEREAS, enrollment in the Cross-cultural Ministry Center is currently limited by:
1) a cap on the number of students that can enroll in the program; 2) where those students are geographically located (typically LCMS Region 5-Western US); and 3) whether the student's ministry context is appropriately "culture crossing" enough to qualify for enrollment; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the California-Nevada-Hawaii District inconvention give thanks to God for the faithful service of our seminaries and for all the various routes leading to ordination; therefore be it finally

RESOLVED, that the California-Nevada-Hawaii District memorialize the 2023 LCMS Convention to direct Concorda Seminary St. Louis to remove the current limitations for the Cross-cultural Ministry Center (number of students geographic allocations of students, and criteria for culture- crossing ministries) to enable more men to prepare for the pastoral ministry without having to leave their homes. Family, employment, and ministry context by way of its hybrid model of education (online and in-person.

MAKING THE CNH DISABILITY MINISTRY TASK FORCE A STANDING MINISTRY COMMITTEE

WHEREAS our Lord has made it clear that it is His Father's deepest desire that "[His] house will be filled," and to this end bids His messengers not to overlook those in society who are most over looked – the poor and people with various disabilities (Luke 14:21-23); and

WHEREAS people with disabilities that hinder their full participation in everyday society represent about 1 in every 5 persons; and

WHEREAS less than 10% of these with disabilities in the world are being effectively reached with the Gospel; and

WHEREAS for ten years the CNH District has had a functioning Disability Ministry Task Force to encourage congregations to make outreach to people with disabilities an intentional part of their total missional activity; and

WHEREAS the mission of this Task Force is "to equip the Church to reach out, include, and encourage full participation of people with disabilities and their families in the life of Christ's Church":

WHEREAS such encouragement needs to be sustained among us until it becomes a fully established ministry emphasis; and

WHEREAS congregations need ongoing assistance in finding resources and existing models of ministry that will be helpful in developing a mature disability ministry of their own; and

WHEREAS the existing CNH District Disability Ministry Task Force is well positioned to offer such encouragement and resources, but can be enhanced in that role by being elevated to a standing ministry committee; THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED that the CNH District Disability Ministry Task Force be elevated to a standing ministry committee within the district administration; and BE IT FURTHER

RESOLVED that its mission statement remain as stated above; and BE IT FINALLY

RESOLVED that the current membership of the Task Force, who already serve at the behest of the CNH District President, constitute the membership of the new Disability Ministry Committee.

WHEREAS, the Mission Training Center (MTC) has, for 37 years, been training men and women in districts of the LCMS to serve in ministry alongside their pastors, and

WHEREAS, MTC has been a resource used by many districts to train Parish Ministry Assistants and Deacons, who served congregations as Licensed Lay Deacons, and

WHEREAS, MTC was effectively connected with the Northwest District-LCMS, and Concordia University, Portland until its closure, and

WHEREAS, the California-Nevada-Hawaii, Pacific Southwest, and Northwest Districts, in partnership with Concordia University Irvine, are now providing leadership and financial support for the continued work of MTC (based in PSD) to benefit congregations and districts across the Synod, and

WHEREAS, districts can no longer license deacons for congregation-based Word and Sacrament ministry because of a decision at the 2016 LCMS Convention, districts continue to support and certify the training of deacons, parish ministry assistants through the work of the Mission Training Center, supporting and equipping lay people to partner with their pastors for ministry and service within local congregations, outreach, church planting, and community service; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that individuals and congregations within the California-Nevada-Hawaii District renew their commitment to the Mission Training Center as a primary resource to prepare men and women for ministry in their congregations; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the members of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District promote the use of MTC in their congregations, pray for the translation of MTC courses into other languages, and to become the go-to training platform with expanded offerings to host on-demand seminars and courses for elders, church treasurers, youth leaders, Sunday School teachers, etc. and be it finally

RESOLVED, that the California-Nevada-Hawaii District give thanks to God for the past, present, and future work of the Mission Training Center by standing in convention and singing the common doxology.

To Strengthen the Non-Voting Advisory Delegates Participation at Conventions

WHEREAS, Currently, there are 12,010 Minsters of Religion - Commissioned (Church Worker Update System - March 2021) who serve the mission and ministry of

congregations, schools, child development centers, camps, Compassion centers, and mission work throughout the national and global mission fields; and

WHEREAS; The current structure of the Synod does not allow for a third category of voting delegates at district and Synod conventions (Synod Handbook: Article IX, Article XII.10.b); and

WHEREAS; The Synod highly values commissioned ministers for their eagerness to serve the Lord and His Church (2019 Resolution. 9-17, "To Study Voting Privilege in the LCMS" p.201 of 2019 LCMS Convention Proceedings); and

WHEREAS; Ministers of Religion – Commissioned are considered Advisory Members with representation, voice but no vote at conventions of districts and Synod, along with "those ordained ministers not eligible for election as a voting delegate" under Bylaw 3.1.2.1(d) ••.(p,101 Handbook 2019) with representation, voice, but no vote at conventions of districts and Synod; and

WHEREAS; At least one other district (Northern Illinois) utilizes the voice and guidance of their commissioned workers in district convention through a non-counted advisory member vote; and

WHEREAS; this honors the bylaw and structure of the Convention while allowing the Nonvoting Advisory Delegate voice to be heard and their vote recognized; therefore, be

Resolved, That the CNH District enable Nonvoting Advisory Delegates to provide a preliminary vote during its regular convention, and be it further

Resolved, That the results of the advisory vote be published prior to the delegate vote; and be it further

Resolved, That this become effective with the next District Convention in 2025, and be it finally

Resolved, That the CNH District in convention memorialize the Synod in Convention to pass a like-minded resolution.

Required Change to the Articles of Incorporation From Synod Secretary John Sias

(4) Relationship and asset disposition language in district governing documents

Bylaw 1.5.3.6 states requirements for relationship and asset disposition language to be included in the governing documents (normally in the Articles of Incorporation, but if such do not exist, in such other suitable document as may control) of all agencies of the Synod, including the districts. Many districts have already addressed this. If your district's articles do not contain the required language, now is the time to act to get them in order. The CCM report in the 2019 Proceedings, on p. 93, lists districts that were not, as of the date of the report, in compliance: "Six districts are not in compliance because they have neither the required relationship or dissolution language in their Articles of Incorporation, namely, the Atlantic, English, Rocky Mountain, SELC, South Eastern, and Texas Districts (the last of which has filed a request with the Board of Directors for an exemption under Bylaw 1.5.3.6). Five districts are in partial compliance, having the necessary dissolution language but not the necessary relationship language, namely, the California/Nevada/Hawaii, New England, Nebraska, Northwest, and Southern districts. Districts are reminded that when they amend their articles, this requires advance approval by the CCM and the changes must after adoption be deposited with the state in which they are incorporated. The form of articles to be adopted should also be checked ahead of time with competent counsel, to ensure that the state will accept the articles as they are to be adopted.

- 1.5.3.6 Notwithstanding anything in the Bylaws to the contrary, the Articles of Incorporation or other governing documents of each agency shall provide:
- (a) That all provisions of its Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws are subject to the provisions of the Constitution, the Bylaws, and the resolutions of the Synod in convention;

- WHEREAS, CNH District Bylaws are required to agree with the Bylaws and Constitution of the LCMS (CNH District Bylaw Article II); and
- WHEREAS, the CHN District Bylaws have recently been reviewed by the Synod's Committee on Constitutional Matters (CCM) and have been found by that committee to be in need of a number of changes to be consistent with the Constitution and Bylaws of the LCMS; and
- WHEREAS, while many of the recommended changes are relatively simple to make, there are others that will require more time and study before they can be presented to the District in Convention for consideration; and
- WHEREAS, the District Committee on Constitutional Matters (DCCM) has reviewed the report of the Synod CCM and has made many of the changes as recommended by that committee as current time restraints allowed; and
- WHEREAS, the DCCM has submitted its recommendations to the CNH District Board of Directors (BOD) and these recommendations have been approved by the Board; therefore be it
- Resolved, That the Voting Delegates of the 2022 CNH District Convention approve the changes recommended by the DCCM and approved by the CNH District BOD and direct that they be incorporated into the Bylaws of the CNH District by the District Secretary and; be it further
- Resolved, That the District CCM, District Secretary and the District Board of Directors continue working to resolve the remaining issues with the CNH Bylaws as suggested in the Synod's CCM report and; be it finally
- Resolved, That the CNH District BOD will present its report concerning the resolution of the remaining issues to the next CNH District Convention.

ARTICLE I MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District is to challenge and assist congregations in their proclamation of the Gospel and ministry to all people.

ARTICLE II RELATIONSHIP TO THE SYNOD

The Constitution and Bylaws of The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod are also the Constitution and Bylaws of the California Nevada Hawaii District of the same. The Constitution of the Synod is also the constitution of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District. The Bylaws of the Synod shall be primarily the bylaws of the District. Both the Bylaws of the Synod and those of the District serve the Gospel mission and ministry of the Lord.

ARTICLE III STRUCTURE OF THE DISTRICT

III.A. The Board of Directors

- 1. The District Board of Directors shall be comprised of 12 members: The First Vice President of the District, who shall serve as Chair of the Board, five Regional Vice Presidents, five Regional Directors, and one Director-Commissioned Minister. The Board will conduct regular meetings at least quarterly. The Board may also meet at other times for purposes consistent with the Bylaws at the call of the District President, the First Vice President, or any five members of the Board of Directors. Seven members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum. In the event of the absence of the First Vice President, the quorum present shall elect a regional Vice President to serve as Chair Pro Tem. (The District President, the District Secretary, and the District Treasurer shall attend all regular meetings of the Board of Directors.)
- 2. Subject to limitations set forth in the Articles of Incorporation, these Bylaws, the *Handbook* Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod, and the statutes of the states in which the District operates, with regard to which the District intends to retain all authority and autonomy allowed a church under the laws and Constitution of the United States and the states in which the District operates. Aall corporate powers shall be exercised by or under the authority of the Board of Directors.
- 3. The District Board of Directors shall:

a. As a primary function, generate and adopt declarations of desired outcomes which will give longterm direction to the District and its President, staff, and committees.

- b. In addition to generating and adopting declarations of desired outcomes, address broad levels of issues in policies of purpose and governance or constraints, leaving lesser levels to the discretion of the District President.
- c. Through the District President, and he through his staff and the District Committees, coordinate the work of the District in accordance with the District Mission Statement, the Bylaws of the Synod, the Bylaws of the District, the District Convention Resolutions, and the declarations of desired outcomes.
- d. Except for assignments of its own work (policies) to committees, consultants, or officers, delegate authority only to the District President.
- e. Provide for an annual audit of the records of the District in such manner directed by the Synod and in accordance with its own policies.
- f. Provide for and oversee the bonding of all District fiscal officers and employees entrusted with the receiving and disbursing of funds, such bonds to be provided by a licensed bonding agency at District expense.
- g. Be empowered to review all activities of the District and its committees, and make binding decisions affecting them; this review may include, but is not limited to, the leadership, membership, purpose, or functions of any activity or Committee.
- h. Approve or disapprove the annual District Budget which the District President shall present.
- i. Be the authority to create and abolish Called positions and act as the Calling body on behalf of the District. The administrative details, including preparation of Call documents, may be delegated to the District President.
- j. Respond in a timely manner to any formal concern <u>related to the Board's area of responsibility</u> addressed to it by the President, Board members, committees authorized by the Bylaws or the Board, Circuit Forums, Circuit Pastors' Conferences, or Congregations of the District or organizations that are ancillary to the District or Synod..
- k. Appoint District Reconcilers as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws Handbook. [MMM2]
- 1. Be the custodian of all property, records, and legacies of the District.
- m. Establish and provide for the maintenance of a headquarters called the District Office, which shall be the official address of the District. All official records of the District shall be kept at the District Office; any exceptions shall require approval of the Board of Directors.
- n. Present reports of its actions at all District Conventions and, if desired, propose recommendations for consideration by the District Convention.
- o. Be responsible to the District for its actions and the actions of all District Officers, Committees, agents, and employees.
- 4. Members of the Board of Directors shall not serve as Chairs of District Committees; nor serve as members of the Nominating Committee; nor be on the District payroll.

III.B. The District President

1. The District President shall be Chief Executive Officer of the District.

2. The District President shall:

a. Be a Minister of Religion – Ordained and be on the roster of the Synod. <u>He must be a member of the District during his tenure.</u>

b. Be a full-time executive.

c. Provide vision and direction for the work of the District, and, in compliance with the policies of the Board of Directors, be the overseer of the work of the District.

d. In consultation with the Board of Directors, appoint all District Committee Chairs, who shall be directly responsible to the President.

e. In consultation with each duly appointed Committee Chair, appoint a sufficient number of members to each Committee to <u>insure ensure</u> its proper functioning (except for the members of the Nominating Committee, which are elected by the District Convention, as required by the Synod <u>Constitution and Bylaws Handbook</u>.²).

f. Be responsible for the proper functioning of all District Committees.

a. Be a minister of Religion – Ordained and be on the roster of the District.

c. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors.

 g. In consultation with other staff professionals and Committee Chairs, and in compliance with the fiscal limitations established by the Board of Directors, be responsible for the preparation of the annual District Budget.

 h. In consultation with the District Board of Directors, contract for service sufficient professional staff personnel to assist the Committees in the performance of their tasks, such contracts to be time limited and coterminous with each term of office of the District President and such personnel to report directly to the President, who shall be responsible for their proper functioning.

i. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors: to provide reports summarizing his activities; to report his perceptions of the progress of District programs; and to receive counsel from the Board.

j. Perform the duties and functions of office as prescribed in the Synod Constsitution and Bylaws Handbook.³

III.C. District Vice Presidents

1. The First Vice President shall:

b. Upon the request of the President, or as directed by the Board of Directors or by the District

Convention, advise, assist, or represent the President.

d. Serve as Chair of the Board of Directors.

2. The Regional Vice Presidents shall:

- a. Be ministers of Religion Ordained, and be on the Roster of the District, and have membership in a
 congregation of their represented region throughout their service.
- b. Upon the request of the President, or as directed by the Board of Directors or by the District
 Convention, advise, assist or represent the President.
 - c. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors.
 - d. Be <u>elected</u> regionally, by caucus, at the regular Convention for no more than two consecutive terms, with the slate presented for possible amendment and final ratification by the District Convention.
 - e. Not be ranked.
 - f. Attend at least one meeting of each Circuit Forum in his region each year: to provide reports summarizing his activities and those of the Board of Directors; to report his perceptions of the progress of District programs; and to receive counsel from the Circuit Forum.

III.D. The Regional Directors

The Regional Directors shall:

- a. Be lay persons.
- b. Be members of District congregations and have membership in a congregation of their represented region throughout their service.
- c. Be <u>elected</u> regionally, by caucus, at the regular Convention for no more than two consecutive terms, with the slate presented for possible amendment and final ratification by the District Convention.
- d. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors.
- e. Attend at least one meeting of each circuit Forum in his/her region each year: to provide reports summarizing his/her activities and those of the Board of Directors; to report his/her perceptions of the progress of District programs; and to receive counsel from the Circuit Forum.

III.E. Director-Commissioned Minister

The Director-Commissioned Minister shall:

- a. Be a minister of Religion Commissioned and be on the roster of the District.
- b. Be elected at the regular Convention.
- c. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors.
- d. Attend at least one District Educators Conference each year: to provide reports summarizing his/her activities and those of the Board of Directors; to report his/her perceptions of the progress of District programs; and to receive counsel from the Educator's Conference.

III.F. The District Secretary

199 The District Secretary shall:

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- 200 a. Be a minister of Religion Ordained and be on the roster of the District.
 - b. Perform all customary duties required and expected of a Corporate Secretary.
 - c. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors, record all proceedings, and within fourteen days publish minutes of the proceedings to all members of the Board of Directors, all District Officers, all Committee Chairs, all Parish Pastors, and all Congregational Presidents of the District. Executive session proceedings shall not be recorded nor minutes taken.
 - d. Arrange for the preparation and publication of *The Convention Manual Workbook* and for its distribution to all professional workers and congregations on the District roster and all designated delegates at least 30 days before the opening of the District Convention.
 - e. Attend the District Convention and record all of its proceedings (assistants being appointed by the President as necessary) and by July 1 following the District Convention publish the *Proceedings of the District Convention* and arrange for its distribution to all professional workers and congregations on the District roster, and all designated delegates.
 - f. In consultation with the District's Committee on Constitutional Matters, publish revisions of the District Bylaws as needed and arrange for their distribution to all professional workers and congregations on the District roster.
 - g. Perform such other duties as the president or the Board of Directors may assign.

III.G. District Treasurer

The Treasurer shall:

- a. Be a lay person.
- b. Be a member of a District congregation.
- c. Administer the office in accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by the District Board of Directors.
- d. Ensure that the District President keeps an accurate account of and disburses District funds according to instructions of the Board of Directors.
- e. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors to monitor the financial health of the District and to provide counsel to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV THE DISTRICT COMMITTEES

IV.A. In General

- 1. District Committees shall:
 - a. Act on their own initiative within their approved budget limitations, and in accordance with <u>the Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod</u>, the Bylaws of the District, Resolutions of the Convention, and policies which have been adopted by the District Board of Directors.

- b. On a timely basis submit to the District President and Board of Directors: proposed Plans of Action; projected costs; projected activities; lists of members; and minutes of meetings.
- c. Determine their own need for professional staff support, such support to be provided as set forth in III.B.2.h above.

2. Committee Chairs shall:

- a. Report directly to the District President, who is responsible for her/his proper functioning.
- b. Annually provide the District President and Board of Directors with a comprehensive, written description of the progress of the Committee's programs.
- c. Prepare a comprehensive, written report for submission to the regular District Convention.
- d. Attend regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors, as required below (Article IV. B & C.).

IV.B. Representation at Board of Directors Meetings

- 1. Any Committee Chair may attend any regular meeting of the Board of Directors.
- 2. Any Committee Chair may be required by the District President or the Board of Directors to attend any regular or special meeting of the Board of Directors.
- 3. Although Committee Chairs answer directly to the District President, they attend Board of Directors meetings to report and to give and receive counsel.

IV.C. Mandated Committees

1. MISSION

- a. This Committee is responsible for coordinating and promoting the mission plans of the District and supporting and encouraging the mission work of every congregation.
- <u>b.</u> This Committee shall operate according to the CNH District Mission Agency policies and procedures as adopted by the Board of Directors.
- b.c. This Committee' shall coordinate with the Office of National Mission and, if applicable, the Office of International Mission.

2. HUMAN CARE MINISTRIES

- a. The Chair of this Committee may attend all regular meetings of the Board of Directors and any special meetings, or when required by the District President or the Board of Directors.
- b. This Committee shall:
- i. Provide liaison for the Synod's Board for Office of National Missions.
- ii. Provide Circuit level assistance in the field of social welfare, especially in coordinating Circuit support for District-wide social welfare projects.

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- 303 iii. Be responsible for giving guidance to the District in the area of social ministry. 304 iv. In consultation with the Congregation(s) or Circuit(s) involved, coordinate the work of specialized 305 Human Care Ministries (although each may have its own guiding committee). 306
 - v. Understand its tasks and function as being congruent with the Objectives of the Synod as set forth in Constitution Article III and mission and ministry emphases of the Synod, as well as resolutions of the District, as regard its area of work those prescribed in the Synod Handbook.⁵

3. STEWARDSHIP

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- a. The Chair of this Committee may attend all regular meetings of the Board of Directors and any special meetings, or when required by the District President or the Board of Directors.
- b. This Committee shall:
- i. Provide liaison for the Synod's Board for Office of National Missions.
- ii. Assist and advise the local congregations in the development and promotion of an adequate stewardship program.
- iii. Promote special gifts and bequests of all kinds for all phases of the church's work, provided such activities do not conflict directly with the Articles of Incorporation of the District.
- iv. Understand its tasks and function as being congruent with the Objectives of the Synod as set forth in Constitution Article III and mission and ministry emphases of the Synod, as well as resolutions of the District, as regard its area of work those prescribed in the Synod Handbook.⁶

CONSTITUTIONAL MATTERS 4

- The Chair of this Committee may attend any regular meeting of the Board of Directors and shall attend any special meeting of the Board of Directors, or when required by the District President or the Board of Directors.
- This Committee shall: b.
- i. Provide liaison for the Synod's Commission on Constitutional Matters.
- ii. Regularly review the Bylaws of the District, and draft proposed revisions which will keep them up to date with current practice.
- iii. Draft proposed revisions to the District Bylaws made necessary by changes in the Synod *Handbook*.
- iv. Immediately after each Convention of the District, draft revisions to the District Bylaws to conform to resolutions adopted by the Convention.
- v. Review proposed revisions of the Articles of Incorporation, Constitution, and Bylaws of District congregations to insure that they conform to the Bylaws of the Synod and District and to state law.
- vi. Interpret the Bylaws of the District in cases of controversy. These opinions shall be binding unless overruled by the District Convention or by the Synod.

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350 351 352 vii. Understand its tasks and function as being congruent with those of the Synod Commission on Constitutional Matters, but with regard to the governing documents unique to the District prescribed in the Synod Handbook.⁷

5. HISTORICAL

a. The Chair of this Committee may attend any regular meeting of the Board of Directors and shall attend any special meeting of the Board of Directors, or when required by the District President or the Board of Directors.

b. This Committee shall:

 i. Collaborate with the Concordia Historical Institute and provide a regional representative for the Institute.

ii. Gather and ensure the safekeeping of records and articles of historical importance to the District and Synod and make them available to qualified researchers.

iii. Promote activities that stimulate historical interest and awareness in the District.

iv. Advise congregations and agencies in establishing and maintaining their own archives.

6. NOMINATING COMMITTEE

a. The Chair of this Committee may attend any regular meeting of the Board of Directors and shall attend any special meeting of the Board of Directors, or when required by the District President or the Board of Directors.

b. This Committee shall:

i. Be elected as part of each Convention's elections process, as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws *Handbook*.⁸

ii. Consist of one Minister of Religion- Ordained, one Minister of Religion- Commissioned, and two lay persons.

iii. Nominate at least two candidates for each of the following elective offices: Regional Directors, Director-Commissioned Minister, Secretary, Treasurer, and the (next Convention) *Nominating Committee* (see above).

iv. Obtain the prior consent of nominees and publish brief biographical sketches in the *Convention Manual. Workbook.*

7. HISPANIC COUNCIL

a. The Chair of this Committee may attend any regular meeting of the Board of Directors and may attend any special meeting of the Board of Directors, or when required by the District President or the Board of Directors.

b. This Committee shall:

ii.

 i. Serve as liaison between Spanish language ministries and the District and its congregations.

Assist in recruiting Spanish language workers.

iii. Assist Spanish language workers in their growth and development.

iv. Assist and advise the District and its congregations in the development of Spanish language ministries.

IV.D. Special Committees

The District President may, by and with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors, create ad hoc Committees as needed. These Committees and their Chairs have the same rights, privileges and accountability as the Mandated Committees.

ARTICLE V DISTRICT CONVENTIONS

The District shall meet in Convention triennially prior to June 1 of the year preceding the Convention of the Synod. In addition to provisions of the Synod *Handbook*⁹ Constitution and Bylaws regarding Conventions of the District, the following regulations shall apply:

V.A. Delegates

Congregations shall register the names (together with a brief biographical sketch) of the delegates and alternates with the District President at least three months prior to the opening of the Convention.

V.B. Committee Appointments

The District President shall announce the appointment of Convention Floor Committees in the pages of the official District publication at least one month prior to the opening of the Convention.

V.C. Convention Manual

 1. The Board of Directors and all Committees of the District, as well as others desiring to bring their work to the attention of the District Convention, shall submit their reports and recommendations to the District President for publication in the *Convention Manual*. Workbook. These reports and recommendations shall be in the office of the District President at least ten weeks prior to the opening of the Convention. The District President, at his discretion, shall have the right to withhold certain overtures and unofficial reports from publication in the *Convention Manual-Workbook*, referring them directly to the appropriate Floor Committee as unpublished overtures and reports for its consideration. Overtures and unofficial reports received later than two weeks prior to the opening of the Convention may be referred to the Convention at the discretion of the District President.

2. One copy of the *Convention Manual* shall be supplied to each Minister of Religion – Ordained or Commissioned, to each congregation on the District roster, and to such others as the Board of Directors shall authorize.

3. The District President shall instruct the District Secretary to publish all the reports and overtures which he supplies, together with the program of the Convention, an outline of the Convention essay, and the District roster (this roster to include all congregations, all Ministers of religion - Ordained and - Commissioned, all officers and Committees of the District and of the Convention). The *Convention Manual Workbook* shall be mailed in time to reach the congregations at least one month prior to the opening of the District Convention.

V.D. Convention Business

- 1. All reports, resolutions, including those from Floor Committees, or other material not contained in the 456 Convention Manual shall be reproduced and distributed to the delegates prior to the opening of the session 457 in which these reports, resolutions, or other materials are to be discussed and considered. 458
- 459 2. Except for overtures, memorials, petitions, or resolutions, no materials appearing in the published 460 Convention Manual shall be read in their entirety on the Convention floor. 461

V.E. Proceedings

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- 1. The Secretary shall be responsible for publication of the District Convention Proceedings by July 1 following the Convention.
- 2. One copy of the *Proceedings* shall be supplied to each minister of Religion Ordained or -Commissioned, each congregation on the District roster, and such others as the Board of Directors shall authorize.

ARTICLE VI NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

VI.A. Elected Officers

The elected officers of the District are President, First Vice President, five Regional Vice Presidents, five 478 Regional Directors, Secretary, Treasurer, members of the Nominating Committee, and a Circuit Visitor for 479 each of the District's Circuits. 480

VI.B. Term of Elected Officers

1. The term of office for all officers of the District shall be for three years.

2. The term of office for the President, First Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Circuit Visitors shall be without limitation to reelection. All other positions shall have a limitation of two successive terms. Onehalf or more More than one-half of a term shall be considered a full term under limited tenure.

VI.C. Pre-Convention Nominations for District President and First Vice-President

491 Nominations for the Offices of President and First Vice-President shall be made in the following manner:

- a. The Secretary of the District shall mail nominating ballots to each voting congregation no later than eight (8) months prior to the Convention.
- b. Each voting congregation of the District is entitled to nominate two Ministers of Religion Ordained from the roster of the Synod as candidates for the office of District President and two Ministers of Religion - Ordained from the roster of the Synod District as candidates for the office of First Vice-President.
- c. Each nominating ballot shall be signed by two officers of the voting congregation and shall be returned to the Secretary of the District no later than six months prior to the opening date of the Convention.
- d. The Secretary of the District shall tabulate nominations and report the names of all clergy receiving three or more nominations in the Convention Manual.

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556 557 the congregations. In the event of a tie for the fifth position among the candidates, all names involved in the tie shall be listed as candidates, as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws Handbook. 10

e. Candidates for President shall be the five receiving the highest number of nominating ballots from

f. Candidates for First Vice-President shall be the five receiving the highest number of nominating ballots from the congregations. In the event of a tie for the fifth position among the candidates, all names involved in the tie shall be listed as candidates, as prescribed by the Synod Handbook. 10

VI.D. Convention Floor Nominations

Except for the Offices of President and First Vice-President, additional nominations for any elective office may be made from the floor of the Convention, from the floor of the Caucus as appropriate, or by any voting delegate; however, the prior consent of the nominee shall have been obtained and a brief biographical sketch submitted to the District Secretary at the time the nomination is made.

A Teller Committee and its Chair shall be appointed by the District President to facilitate the election of officers.

VI.F. Order of Elections

VI.E. Teller Committee

- 1. Election of the President
 - a. In the first business of the session of the Convention, the Teller Committee shall conduct the election for the office of President.
 - b. Each voting delegate shall be entitled to vote for one of the candidates for President, whose names appear on the slate published by the District Secretary.
 - c. The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared President.
 - d. If additional balloting is necessary, the candidate receiving the smallest number of votes shall be eliminated on each subsequent ballot until one candidate receives a majority of the votes cast. In the event of ties for the smallest number, all those tied shall be eliminated.
- 2. Election of the First Vice President
 - a. In the first business session of the Convention, the Teller Committee shall conduct the election for the office of First Vice President.
 - Each voting delegate shall be entitled to vote for one of the candidates for First Vice President, whose names appear on the slate published by the District Secretary.
 - The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared First Vice President.
 - If additional balloting is necessary, the candidate receiving the smallest number of votes shall be eliminated on each subsequent ballot until one candidate receives a majority of the votes cast. In the event of ties for the smallest number, all those tied shall be eliminated.
- 3. Election of the Regional Vice Presidents and Regional Directors

- a. The Regions shall caucus to nominate their Regional Vice Presidents and the Regional Director. Each Region will submit to the Convention one nomination for Regional Vice President and one nomination for Regional Director.
- <u>b.</u> In the Regional caucus, the Teller Committee will facilitate the nomination of the Regional Vice President according to the process used for nomination of First Vice President. as follows:
 - i Nominations from credentialed Lay and Pastoral delegates from the Region are accepted from the floor of the Caucus. All those nominated and have agreed to serve will comprise the slate. Nominees will be allowed to make a brief introductory statement.
- b. ii If no one has received a majority on the first ballot, the candidate receiving the smallest number of votes shall be eliminated on each subsequent ballot until one candidate receives a majority of the votes cast. In the event of ties for the smallest number, all those tied shall be eliminated.
- c. In the Regional caucus, the Teller Committee will present the slate prepared by the Nominating Committee for the office of Regional Director; and entertain nominations from the floor of the caucus as allowed in Article *VI.D* above. <u>Upon closure of the slate, the caucus shall by ballot select its candidate.</u> The Candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared nominated.
- d. The Teller Committee shall submit to the Convention a final slate of candidates for the offices of Regional Vice President and Regional Director to be ratified by the Convention.
- e. The Teller Committee shall conduct the election (ratification) of the Regional Vice Presidents and Regional Directors.
- 4. Succeeding elections shall be conducted by the Teller Committee for the following offices:
 - a. For the Director-Commissioned Minister, for the Secretary, and for the Treasurer from the slate prepared by the Nominating Committee, supplemented by nominations from the floor. The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected.
 - b. For the (next Convention) Nominating Committee from the slate prepared by the Nominating Committee, supplemented by nominations from the floor. The candidates receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected.
 - c. For Circuit Visitors from the slate published by the District Secretary, as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws *Handbook*.¹¹

VI.G. Ballots

On all ballots, candidates shall be listed in alphabetical order. There shall be no indication of incumbency by special mark.

VI.H Records of Elections

All ballots in each election shall be preserved by the Chair of the Teller Committee until the close of the Convention and shall then be destroyed, as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws Handbook. 12

VI.I. Vacancies

- 1. When the Office of President becomes vacant, or when the President is incapacitated, the Office shall
- be assumed by the First Vice President. If less than six months of the term remains, he may serve out the
- term in a part-time capacity. If more than six months remains, he must be willing to assume the position
- full-time. If he declines, a new President shall be elected by the Board of Directors.
- 614 2. When the office of First Vice President becomes vacant, a new First Vice President shall be elected by
- the Board of Directors.

- 3. Vacancies in any other elected office of the District shall be filled by Presidential appointment by and
- with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors. In the event any officer of the District shall become
 - incapable of service, the Board of Directors shall relieve that person of his/her duties.

VI.J. Delegates to the Synod Convention

- 1. Election of the delegates and alternates (voting) shall be as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws *Handbook*. 13
- 2. Election of advisory delegates and alternates in the categories of Minister of Religion Ordained and of Minister of Religion Commissioned shall be as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws Handbook.¹⁴
 - 3. Selection of other District advisory representatives shall be as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws *Handbook*. 15
 - 4. Selection of the District's youth representatives shall be made by a District Youth Task Force, as prescribed in the Synod *Handbook*. ¹⁶

VI.K. Installation of Officers

- 1. All District officers elected at the Convention shall be installed prior to on July 1 following the Convention, or as soon thereafter as practicable. The President shall designate the installing officer and the date, time, and place of the installation.
 - 2. The President and other District Officers leaving office shall continue to hold the authority and responsibility of office until July 1 following the Convention. The incoming President and other District Officers shall assume office on July 1 following the Convention.
 - 3. Any expenses of the newly elected officers related to assuming office shall be the responsibility of the District.

- 1. The authority to determine Regional and Circuit divisions shall rest with the District Convention, as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws. *Handbook*. ¹⁷
- 2. The purpose and function of each Circuit and Circuit Forum shall be as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws. *Handbook*. 18
- 3. Within two months after each District Convention, each Circuit Forum shall meet and elect such officers as it deems necessary to support the Circuit Visitor who was elected by the District Convention.

- 4. Each congregation or multi-congregation parish shall be represented at the Circuit Forum at least by the pastor and one member designated by the congregation, as prescribed the Synod Constitution and Bylaws Handbook.¹⁹
 - 5. Each Circuit Forum may submit overtures to the District Board of Directors as well as to Synod and District Conventions, as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws Handbook.²⁰

ARTICLE VIII AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS

VIII.A. Amendments by Direct Convention Action

Amendments to these Bylaws may be made by the District Convention provided:

- a. The change is not contrary to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod.
- b. The proposed change is presented to the Convention in writing.
- c. The proposed material is specified as a Bylaw amendment and is studied as such by a Convention floor committee.
- d. The change is adopted by a majority vote by the Convention.
- d.e. Changes proposed by the District are reviewed and approved in advance by the Synod's Commission on Constitutional Matters (CCM).

VIII.B. Amendment by Indirect Convention Action

- 1. Amendments to these Bylaws shall be made when the District Convention shall have created new entities without having established Bylaw provisions for them or when District Convention action affecting these Bylaws has been taken without providing the necessary new texts.
- 2.—Needed revisions to these Bylaws shall be drafted by the District Constitutional Matters Committee and submitted to the next District Convention for approval, after first being reviewed and approved in advance by the Synod's CCM. Further changes made without CCM approval will take effect only after such approval.

VIII. C. Amendment by Synod Action

- 1. Amendments to these Bylaws shall be made when action taken by the Synod's Convention shall have set them at variance with the Synod's Constitution and Bylaws.
- 2. Needed revisions to these Bylaws shall be drafted by the District Committee on Constitutional Matters and submitted to the next District Convention for approval.
- When necessitated by amendments to the Synod Constitution or Bylaws or otherwise expressly directed by a resolution of the Synod in convention, amendments may be made by a two-thirds majority of the District Board of Directors. Such amendments shall be drafted by the District Secretary and shall be reviewed in advance by the LCMS Commission on Constitutional Matters.

VIII.D. Publication of Bylaw Revisions

713 714	Whenever it becomes necessary to publish new editions of the Bylaws of the District (whether entirely or in substantial sections), the Secretary shall have responsibility for their publication.

WHEREAS,	the California-Nevada-Hawaii District of the LCMS sought to expand and centralize the primary office for staff and district ministries by relocating from Grace Lutheran Church, San Francisco to their current offices in Livermore; and
WHEREAS,	the current CNH District offices are larger than necessary for the current mission; and
WHEREAS,	the CNH District of the LCMS has experienced changes in both staffing and the way ministry is conducted and
WHEREAS,	the District's primary mandate in its Bylaws is, "to challenge and assist congregations in their proclamation of the Gospel and ministry to all people;" and
WHEREAS,	the district is utilizing new means of ministry and care for congregations (i.e.; electronic); therefore be it
RESOLVED,	that the CNH District in Convention direct the President to establish a task force to study if the current office meets both the present and future needs of the District in direct relation to it's primary mandate; and be it finally
RESOLVED,	that the Task Force give recommendations to the District Board of Directors as to possible solutions to best maximize ministry and stewardship for the sake of the Church in preparation for the 2025 District convention.

To Consider Re-alignment of Objectives 1 & 2 for Synod Constitution Article 3

WHEREAS, in Scripture there is clear teaching about the mission and witness of the church given by our Lord Himself (Matthew 28:18-20, Acts 1:8), and

WHEREAS, in Scripture there is no official structure for the church or church bodies given, and

WHEREAS, the church is blessed when the mission of God is first in the hearts of its people, and a primary focus on official structure providing defense against schism, sectarianism, and heresy is, while noble, a departure from our first love, and

WHEREAS, Article III of the Constitution of the LCMS states:

The Synod, under Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions, shall—

- 1. Conserve and promote the unity of the true faith (Eph. 4:3–6; 1 Cor. 1:10), work through its official structure toward fellowship with other Christian church bodies, and provide a united defense against schism, sectarianism (Rom. 16:17), and heresy;
- 2. Strengthen congregations and their members in giving bold witness by word and deed to the love and work of God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and extend that Gospel witness into all the world;...

WHEREAS, this is not the original order of our objectives but was shifted in the year 1917 when the Constitution was rewritten and the order was changed without specific convention attention to the order of Article 3

WHEREAS there has been a demonstrated deterioration in Mission outreach for the past fifty years

WHEREAS, a priority of "bold witness" applies to both those already gathered in the worshipping church and those who are yet to come to faith in Christ and will not impede an emphasis on bringing this witness with sound and pure doctrine.

RESOLVED, that the CNH District in Convention take note of and apply this priority and word and action

AND BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that the CNH memorialize the Synod in its 2023 Convention to return the "bold witness" and the mission of God to its rightful place as the first objective of a church of Christ dedicated to unity of the true faith which proclaims the Gospel of Jesus Christ into all the world.

TO DELAY CONSIDERATION OF CONCORDIA UNIVERSITY SYSTEM RESTRUCTURING

WHEREAS, the 2019 Convention of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod called for a Task Force to study and propose a reorganization of the Concordia University System, and

WHEREAS, the Task Force was organized and has proposed such a reorganization, and

WHEREAS, this proposal is built around the theology of the Two Kingdoms that distinguishes between the practical matters of an institution (Kingdom of the Left Hand) and the theological principles that form its foundation (Kingdom of the Right Hand), and

WHEREAS, this proposal allows the leaders in the Synod as those responsible for Kingdom of the Right Hand issues to exert influence that could hamper the leaders of the universities (their presidents and Board of Regents) in their ability to manage their Kingdom of the Left Hand responsibilities, and

WHEREAS, the proposal provides a significant voice of influence for leaders in the Synod over the institutions with virtually no accountability for the impact of that influence,

WHEREAS, this proposal is dependent upon an interpretation of the First Amendment of the United States Constitution that provides the leadership of the Synod with a significant protection from financial liability that is still under consideration by the courts, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the CNH District memorialize to the 2023 LCMS Convention to delay action on the recommendations of the Task Force, and be it further

RESOLVED, that this Task Force would study and report on the closures of the three universities in the past five years before forming a new proposal.

WHEREAS, the LCMS has a history of variety in its training of ordained ministers (the practical seminary and the theological seminary of the 20th century), and

WHEREAS, academic training has taken advantage of technology to offer distance education and it has become a standard of delivering training in many contexts in our culture, and

WHEREAS, there is a need to provide training to those already serving ministries in other capacities, and

WHEREAS, the Cross-Cultural Ministry Center has provided many ordained ministers who arc serving effectively across the Synod, and

WHEREAS, there is the opportunity for the Cross-Cultural Ministry Center and the Districts of the Synod to work together to identify ministry settings and candidates and to provide for their training while they serve alongside ordained ministers, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the CNH District memorialize the 2023 Synod Convention to identify the Cross-Cultural Ministry Center as a means to train general pastors for the Synod, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the seminaries of the Synod be encouraged lo study how

to train general pastors by distance education, and be it finally

RESOLVED, that the seminaries and the Districts of the Synod consider how they can work together to provide more general pastors for the mission of the Gospel.

To Address the Lutheran Teacher Shortage and Low Teacher Salaries by hitiating a Student Debt Assistance Program for LCMS Commissioned Minister - Teacher

WHEREAS; our Lutheran Schools struggle to find rostered teachers to serve in the classrooms of our High Schools, Elementary Schools, and Child Development Centers¹; and

WHEREAS; research has shown that a primary reason for this is the bwer salary offered for teachers within the Lutheran school systems; and

WHEREAS; Concordia Plans reported in 2021 that 27% of LCMS workers have student debt that averages \$46,000 per student; and

WHEREAS; The reality of Student Loan Debt is an important part of the decision to seek employment outside the Lutheran school; and

WHEREAS; it is a value that we fill our schools with rostered workers⁴; then be it

Resolved, That a National Lutheran Teacher Student Debt Assistance Program be developed that recognizes the service of Lutheran Teachers through Student Loan Debt Forgiveness, and be it further

Resolved, That a committee comprising of members of the Education Department of the Concordia University System, LCMS School Ministry, Concordia Plans, The Foundation, and the Council of Presidents develops the loan forgiveness process, and be it further

Resolved, That a special, designated offering to establish this program be taken during the National Lutheran Schools Weeks of 2024, 2025, and 2026, and be it further

Resolved, That reports of this work be provided through regular communications of the Synod, and be it finally

Resolved, that the California-Nevada-Hawaii District memorialize the Synod in Convention to adopt the National Lutheran Teacher Student Debt Assistance Program.

WHEREAS, the present technological resources available to congregations make supervision of Licensed Lay Deacons by Ordained Ministers more accessible and effective, and

WHEREAS, the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod affirms the Word of God and the work of the Holy Spirit calls people to faith in Jesus Christ and sustains them in that faith, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Synod in Convention establish a Task Force to reconsider the use of Licensed Lay Deacons in Word and Sacrament ministry within its congregations, and be it further

RESOLVED, that members of the Task Force specifically include Districts that have historically made extensive use of Licensed Lay Deacons in Word and Sacrament ministry, and be it further

RESOLVED, any use of Licensed Lay Deacons in Word and Sacrament ministry must occur under the direct supervision of an Ordained Minister, and be it further

RESOLVED, that the appointed Task Force study the document, <u>Workers for His Harvest</u>, submitted by the Northwest District Board of Directors following the 2016 Synod Convention, and be it finally

RESOLVED, that the California-Nevada-Hawaii District in convention submit this resolution to the 2023 Synod Convention.

To Recognize and Thank the LCMS for the Strengthened and Expanded "Soldiers of the Cross" COVID-19 Response Inititive

WHEREAS; The Pandemic of 2020 shuttered schools in the middle of the school year, furloughed workers and caused others to pivot towards a digital presence for which they were unprepared; and

WHEREAS; Many of our teachers and school workers were without the additional tuition or budget income needed to support the immediate response to the transition and additional regulations that were placed upon them through the Centers for Disease Control and the Executive orders of local, state, and national government; and

WHEREAS; The need for compassionate support and financial assistance was great; and

WHEREAS; The Lutheran Church -Missouri Synod (LCMS) and The Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) worked together to identify funds for immediate assistance for all who served in Lutheran ministries; and

WHEREAS; Many of our school and child development workers who were both rostered and lay benefited from this generous act of compassion; and

WHEREAS; As of September 2020 more than \$1,516,847 was awarded to 902 workers; be it therefore

RESOLVED, that on behalf of the workers of our Lutheran churches, schools, and centers the California-Nevada-Hawaii District in Convention publicly thank God for the generosity of His people, The LCMS, and the LCEF for supporting all who serve in our schools and child care centers.

To create a third pathway for general pastoral colloquy for members of LCMS congregations who have graduated with an accredited Masters of Divinity Degree from a Non-LCMS Seminary.

WHEREAS, God's Word call us to pray for additional workers in the harvest, "When he (Jesus) saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest;" (Matthew 936-37, ESV); and

WHEREAS, pastors of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod are retiring in larger numbers than ever before and the number of men entering our seminaries is less than what is needed to replace these faithful servants and expand further mission and ministry; and

WHEREAS, the congregations of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District – LCMS give thanks to God and celebrate the various alternate routes to ordination and pastoral ministry available in the LCMS, such as Specific Ministry Pastors (SMP), there is a growing need for general ordination pastors who are able to receive divine calls from congregations without restriction, provide supervision for other rostered church workers, supervise vicars, hold elected or appointed office on the district or national Synod level such as a Circuit Visitor, and vote as delegates at the Synodical conventions of the church; and

WHEREAS, there are pathways by which pastors, from church bodies outside the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, who meet specific criteria may secure admission to the ministerium of LCMS as general ordination pastors through Colloquy. This admission may be provided through a "colloquy" (discussion, interview) with the Colloquy Committee for the Pastoral Ministry; and

WHEREAS, The Policy Manual for Admission to the Pastoral Ministry of The Lutheran Church- Missouri Synod by Colloquy: Bylaws and Policies states that applicants for Colloquy must fit into one of two categories (the Colloquy Committee for the Pastoral Ministry is responsible for the final determination of the category in each individual situation):

 Active Pastors from Other Christian Church Bodies: Men who, at the time of application are in good standing and in active service as pastors in another Christian Church body/denomination may apply for colloguy. • Men who have prepared for pastoral ministry but, at the time of application, are not in active service as pastors: Such applicants must be graduates of a program of study that leads to ordination, from an accredited institution, with no fewer than 60 semester hours (90 quarter hours) of required academic credit. Applicants with prior pastoral service must provide the date (month and year) and the reason (e.g. retirement, resignation, dismissal) their active service ended. Such an applicant also must have been a communicant member in good standing in a congregation of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod for at least two years immediately prior to the time of application. This category does not apply to LCMS members who while members of LCMS congregations have obtained Master of Divinity degrees outside the LCMS; and

WHEREAS, Men who have been long-time members in good standing in a congregations of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, but are graduates of programs of study leading to ordination from an accredited institution outside the Lutheran Church-Missouri (meeting all the necessary academic credit requirements), are not afforded he same opportunity to apply for Colloquy, but must enroll inthe Residential Alternative Route Program (requiring a two year residential academic program at one of our two seminaries and a one year vicarage) before becoming a general ordination pastor in the LCMS; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that because the need for additional pastors is so significant for the present and future mission and ministry of the congregations of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District and the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, that the California-Nevada-Hawaii District memorialize the 2024 LCMS Convention to create a third pathway for general pastoral colloquy that provides the opportunity for long-time members of LCMS congregations who have graduated from programs of study leading to ordination from outside the seminaries of the LCMS (satisfying all the necessary academic credit requirements) to become general ordnation pastors by way of the Colloquy process, without enrolling in the Residential Alternative Route Program.
