First Session Friday, May 6th, 2022

PRE-CONVENTION ACTIVITIES

On Thursday, May 5th convention attendees gathered at Prince of Peace Lutheran Church and School in Fremont at 6:30 pm for a "Cinco de Mayo" themed dinner and time of fellowship. The dinner was followed by a Service of Divine Worship in the Church sanctuary. The sermon for the evening was presented by Synod President, the Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison. President Harrison's theme for the evening's message was "Rock Solid".

1. ORIENTATION

Secretary Rev. John Standley welcomed delegates to the convention at 9:30 am and offered comments about convention procedure. Convention Parliamentarian Rev. Richard Rice reviewed the Convention Standing Rules.

This year the convention will use the Election Buddy program for voting. LCEF District Vice President, Edward Kwak offered an overview of the system and Log-In instructions. After all voting delegates had access to the program several test votes were taken. Edward, Doug Benton, and others were available throughout the convention to assist delegates.

2. OPENING

CNH District President Rev. Michael Lange opened the convention at 10:15 am. The President's opening comments built on the convention theme "Building Our House(s) on the Rock".

Mike went on to introduce several of our guests and district workers: LCMS Synod President Matthew Harrison, CNH President Emeritus Walter Tietjen and his wife Ione, CNH President Emeritus Robert Newton and his wife Pricilla, Mike's wife Kristi Lange, CNH 1st Vice President Tom Zelt, CNH Board of Directors, and Administrative Assistant Glenna Sanlis.

The President thanked Rev. Dr. Tom Zelt, the Worship Team, and all the workers at Prince of Peace that made Thursday evening's pre-convention activities such a memorable experience.

3. REGISTRATION REPORT

Rev. John-Paul Meyer presented the first Convention Registration Report. A complete list of convention attendees will be posted in the Convention Proceedings.

4. ADOPTION OF THE STANDING RULES

President Lange asked for a motion to approve the Standing Rules that were read by Parliamentarian Rick Rice during the Orientation. *A motion was made and seconded to adopt the Standing Rules. The motion was approved.*

5. ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

The President asked for a motion to approve the Convention Agenda as posted earlier by email. A motion was made and seconded to adopt the Convention Agenda. The motion was approved.

6. OPENING DEVOTION

Rev. Mark Whittaker, Senior Administrative Pastor of Peace Lutheran Church – Arroyo Grande, CA offered the opening devotion. In his devotion Rev. Whittaker followed the Convention theme "Building Our House(s) on the Rock" noting that the Rock is no mere concept, rather it is a new reality. Building Our House(s) on the Rock is a complete reorientation of life.

Peter denied Christ, later Jesus appears to Peter with His peace (Shalom). Christ's peace was life-changing for Peter just as it is for us. What would it be like to see Jesus in the tomb and then three days later be in the presence of the Risen Lord? Peter was changed forever, as are we.

Mark used a series of Scripture readings in his devotion. That list can be found in the addendum to the convention minutes. The time of devotion was closed with prayer and singing of the hymn "Now All the Vault of Heaven Resounds" LSB 465

7. MEMORIAL ROLL CALL

President Lange called the names of the Ordained and Commissioned Ministers that were called to glory in the past Quadrennium. The list of these names can be found in the Convention Workbook.

8. DISTRICT PRESIDENT'S REPORT - PART 1

President Lange offered opening remarks reflecting on the challenges in the District over the past four years. A video was shown building on the theme of the convention – Building Our House(s) on the Rock. (Check the Convention Website for Convention Videos).

Mike introduced Joel Wahlers who serves as Assistant to the President - Education. Joel spoke briefly about the Strategic Ministry Plan (SMP) that has been developed by the president and staff as a strategic plan for district operations. Joel reviewed the five components of the plan – Mission / Vision / Values / Goals / Initiatives.

Joe Robb Assistant to the President – Missions introduced a video featuring the Mercy Hollistic Ministry led by Rev. Berhanu Didanu. The ministry offers showers and other basic needs to the homeless community in the Greater Sacramento Area.

Mike added additional comments to conclude the first part of his report.

9. WELCOME TO NEW DISTRICT CONGREGATIONS

The President welcomed to the podium representatives of two new District congregations: St. Matthew's – Kauai, Hawaii, and Shepherd of the Valley – Galt, CA. Members of the third congregation Trinity – Chowchilla, CA were not able to attend. The Lay members representing St. Matthew's and Shepherd of the Valley met with Secretary Standley to sign the District's constitution.

10. ELECTION PROCEDURES

Rev. Rob Weller, Chair of the Elections Committee thanked his committee and offered comments concerning election procedures. Rob advised that nominations from the floor would be accepted for all elections except for President and First Vice President. Permission from the nominee and a short Bio would be required for all floor nominations. Rob also reviewed the process that is proposed for elections in the Regional Caucuses.

13. WEST COAST DISTRICT PARTNERSHIPS

President Lange introduced the President of the Pacific Southwest District Rev. Dr. Mike Gibson and Rev. Dr. Paul Linnemann President of the Northwest District.

President Linnemann addressed the convention speaking of the importance of the partnership that has developed between the three West Coast Districts. Paul stressed that ministry on the West Coast is challenging – "We need each other"!

President Gibson reiterated the importance of the alliance between the districts, adding that "Isolation destroys us". Mike advised that the Mission Training Center which is now based at Concordia Irvine is more important than ever after the end of the Licensed Lay Deacon program at the 2016 Convention of the Synod. He said that the Mission Training Center still trains Deacons as well as other servants. He went on to note that the District's Mission Executives also meet together. Rev. Gibson ended by saying, "We are in this together".

President Lange also spoke about the necessity of the partnership. He talked about the importance for him of the Zoom calls that take place between the three Presidents at

the start of each week. Mike also mentioned the ongoing training of new pastors that is offered as a joint program between the districts. Mike concluded his comments by saying, "We're better together".

Rev. Gowen offered a prayer with the three Presidents ending with this quote from Isaiah Chapter 43, "Now this is what the LORD says— the One who created you, Jacob, and the One who formed you, Israel— "Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by your name; you are Mine. I will be with you when you pass through the waters, and when you pass through the rivers, they will not overwhelm you. You will not be scorched when you walk through the fire, and the flame will not burn you."

14. BREAK FOR LUNCH

Before the lunch break, Rev. Zelt announced that the amount of the offering that was received at the Worship service on Thursday was \$2501.00. The funds will go to help finance the work of the Mercy Holistic Ministry. Tom then offered the meal prayer.

During lunch, which was served in the Convention Hall, videos were shown featuring the LCMS Armed Forces Ministry and Concordia Plan Services. There were also slides from various exhibitors.

SECOND SESSION DAY ONE

President Lange called the session to order at 1:00 pm

14. REGISTRATION REPORT

Rev. John-Paul Meyer presented the second Convention Registration Report. A complete list of Convention attendees will be posted in the Convention Proceedings.

15. GREETINGS FROM OTHERS

In introducing President Emeritus Walter Tietjen, President Lange talked about the help Walt had given him during his first term saying, "Walt showed me what pastoral care looks like."

Walt spoke words of encouragement to the convention attendees as he so aptly does. He noted the discouraging words that so often flow from the mouths of the world around us. He acknowledged that those voices can sometimes get so loud that we may want to say, "I quit". When those times come, he advised us to "look to the cross and hear Jesus say, I didn't"

President Lange went on to introduce President Emeritus, Robert Newton. Bob quipped that he thought that this was the youngest group that he could ever remember.

In his remarks, Rev. Newton reflected on the effects of Covid on the ministry of the church. He remarked about how he had watched Mike go from Prophet (Mission Exec) to King (District President) and how in light of COVID that came at just the right time. He recalled hearing during COVID that the church was not essential and then watched and worked as the church pushed back. Rev. Newton closed his thoughts with prayer.

16. CNH DISTRICT BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Before getting into the report of the District Board President Lange asked Tom and Sue Zelt and his wife Kristi to join him on the podium. Mike and Kristi presented gifts to Tom and Sue thanking them both for their service to the district and to the church.

Chair of the CNH District Board of Directors Tom Zelt presented the report of the Board. Tom briefly reviewed policy-based governance and noted that in that system a major work of the board is to build the Outcomes (Goals). Perhaps even more important is the crafting of the Metrics or the means by which the Outcomes are measured.

Tom briefly reviewed the Outcomes that the Board has worked with during the past Quadrennium.

- 1. THE CNH DISTRICT CONSISTS OF WELL-EQUIPPED, HEALTHY, MISSIONALLY-COMMITTED LEADERS.
 - A. There is a district-wide culture that facilitates the overall wellness and equipping of leaders
 - B. Identify and utilize *and retain* leaders across the district to assist others in mission for both congregations and schools.
- 2. CONGREGATIONS HAVE A POSITIVE MISSION DIRECTION.
 - A. Congregations have hope with a vision for the future.
 - B. Cooperative ministries between congregations are fostered and enabled
- 3. BASIC CONGREGATIONAL AND SUPPORT SERVICES ARE PROVIDED IN AN EFFICIENT AND COST-EFFECTIVE WAY.

Tom noted the increased portion of the district's funds now going to missions even as support from congregations has declined. He gave thanks for the opportunities that the district has given him to be of service.

17. LCEF REPORT

President Lange introduced Edward Kwak who serves as the LCEF District Vice President to the CNH District. Ed commended Bill Swift for all the fine work he did with the Lutheran Church Extension Fund in the CNH District. He stated that he is working closely with Joe Robb. He also noted that \$59,000.00 has come from LCEF to go toward Worker Wellness. In closing, a video was shown highlighting the Worker Wellness programs.

18. CONVENTION BUSINESS

Resolution #3-06 -- Mr. Don Young representing Floor Committee #3 was welcomed to the podium. Don presented Resolution #3-06 -- TO RECOGNIZE AND THANK THE LCMS FOR THE STRENGTHENED AND EXPANDED "SOLDIERS OF THE CROSS" COVID-19 RESPONSE INITIATIVE

Don moved for approval of the resolution. The motion was seconded. The Chair called for discussion, hearing none the vote was called for by way of Hands and Voices. The motion was approved.

Resolution #1-03 -- Rev. James Beyer Chair of Floor Committee #1 introduced Rev. Otis Byrd who presented resolution #1-03 -- MAKING THE CNH DISABILITY MINISTRY TASK FORCE A STANDING MINISTRY COMMITTEE

Rev. Byrd moved for approval of the resolution. The motion was seconded. The Chair called for discussion, hearing none the vote was called for by way of Hands and Voices. The motion was approved.

19. SYNOD PRESIDENT'S REPORT

President Harrison began his report with a video presentation reviewing some of the work of the Synod over the past four years. The video also featured many of the programs offered through the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod.

Matthew introduced the Greek word - Homologeto. (ὁμολογία)

He said the word literally means to speak the same. It is used throughout scripture to confess our sins. Scripture is all about us as sinners, not about telling others of their sins. We are sinner-saints. The confession of the early church was "Jesus is Yahweh".

The President then offered a second Greek word – Marturion (μ αρτύριον) which is translated as confession/witness. In John Chapter 4 the woman at the well witnessed what she had heard and believed and those who heard her came and believed. Our witness is a strong confession of our faith.

Homologeto – President Harrison referred to Matthew 11:25 – "At that time Jesus said," I praise you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and learned and revealed them to little children". Rev. Harrison noted that a life of thankful praise is our confession. He went on to say that after 175 years of the LCMS we are losing our privileged position, but we still have the one thing left "Only Jesus".

President Harrison turned to a PowerPoint presentation on the effects and responses to COVID. He stated that he believes that the government has no business inside the sanctuary - that belongs to the individual congregation.

Rev. Dr. Harrison reviewed some of the Synod's programs including the work of our universities and seminaries. He also spoke of our sister church in Finland and the trials that they have endured in their fight to stay true to scripture. He talked a bit about the LCMS International Missions' work in South Sudan. The President mentioned that we

are now down about one hundred missionaries because of COVID. He also said that we only have twelve people to support all our missionary families.

The President added commentary to captions that were projected on the screens in the meeting room to highlight some of the many activities and accomplishments of the LCMS.

- Online Missionary study for ministry opening ministries to many places we have never been before.
- Mission is reaching out to many Farsi-speaking people. Many Muslim converts.
- Dominican seminary has over 200 graduates -- New Latin American hymnal.
- 15 Seminaries in Africa -- prosperity theology is a big problem.
- Life network continues to grow.
- First ever official Chainsaw use manual -- Legal Counsel approved. 😌
- 19,000 "Everyone His Witness" workbooks sold.
- LCMS was able to move forward with the Youth Gathering.
- Child Protection program.
- Best financial condition in 30+ years -- maybe best ever.
- 4 million to seminaries.
- "Set Apart to Serve" -- Church worker recruitment program.
- Annotated Large Catechism is coming out.
- 2 million in Church Planting Grants (Small grants work better).
- Church Planting "Boot Camp" planned. (Churches that plant churches tend to grow).

After this, President Harrison took time for questions. Those questions are listed below.

- 1. What is the Synod's position on online worship and communion?
- 2. Suggestion to study the effects of the Lutheran Hour broadcast from its inception.
- 3. As a church body is there a way that we might be better prepared for persecution such as we experienced during covid?
- 4. What might be ways that the dichotomy between the missional and confessional divide might find common ground?

(Secretary's note – The President's answers were candid and in-depth. As such I do not feel that short of a word for word verbatim, I could accurately do justice to his presentation.)

President Harrison closed his report with a blessing.

20. CONVENTION BUSINESS

Resolution # 3-01 -- Rev. Daniel Deuel, Chair of Floor Committee #3 was welcomed to the podium. The committee presented Resolution # 3-01 -- TO CONSIDER REALIGNMENT OF OBJECTIVES 1 & 2 FOR SYNOD CONSTITUTION ARTICLE 3

The committee moved to approve Resolution #3-01, the motion received a second. There was considerable discussion before the Chair called for the question. The motion to end discussion was seconded and approved with a vote by hand and voice. The Chair announced that the resolution had been adopted. There was then a call for a "Division of the House". That vote by hand and voice was counted twice. **The motion to accept Resolution #3-01 was approved 77 Yes / 31 No.**

Resolution #3-03 -- Floor Committee #3 introduced Resolution #3-03. TO INCREASE THE NUMBER OF STUDENTS PREPARING FOR GENERAL ORDINATION THROUGH DISTANCE LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES AND BY EXPANDING THE WORK OF THE CROSS-CULTURAL MINISTRY CENTER - CUI(CMC). (Note - #3-03 is a compilation of original Resolutions #3-03, #3-04, and #1-02)

The committee moved that Resolution #3-03 be approved. The motion was seconded. After a significant period of discussion, the chair called the question. *The motion was approved by a hand and voice vote*.

21. DISTRICT PRESIDENT'S REPORT - PART 2

Board chair Tom Zelt welcomed President Lange to the podium for part 2 of his report. Mike asked Rev. Eric Van Scharrel who is a member of the Missio Dei Foundation to join him at the podium to offer information about the newly formed organization. Pastor Van Scharrel talked about the work of the Foundation. He noted that resources from closed congregations that have chosen to work with the Foundation would be invested. Earnings from those funds will be used for mission activity in the district. President Lange added that the district also has committees to assist congregations that are considering the future path of their ministry.

Mike went on to speak about the value of prayer in reaching out to non-believers. He related the experiences that he and Kristi have had in conversation with some of their neighbors. He asked those present to take about 5 minutes to talk with others at their table concerning experiences they may have had in reaching out to neighbors with the gospel and then end with prayer.

President Lange introduced District Mission Executive, Rev. Joe Robb. Joe talked about the changes in demographics in the district and about the ways mission is conducted. He noted that there are many options for mission education in our district. He talked about the SMP program and how that program allowed Rev. Willian Pierce to be ordained, enabling him to provide Word and Sacrament ministry to Saint Matthew's Lutheran Church in Kauai, one of the congregations that were welcomed into the district and Synod this morning.

Rev. Robb went on to talk about the work of LINC Ministries - Bay Area which has been helpful in furthering mission in our district. A video featuring Director Aaron Putnam and

the work of LINC – Bay Area was shown. Joe closed by talking about a few of the tools that are available through the mission agency including grants, short-term mission trips, and mission plants.

Assistant to the President for Education Joel Wahlers was welcomed to the podium. Joel asked those present to turn to page 34 in the Convention Workbook. He stated that there are 50 preschools in the CNH district serving 2810 students, 18 elementary schools, and 1 high school serving together 3469 students. In addition, there are various groups and many people who support the district education system.

Joel talked about the challenge of attracting qualified staff. He noted that using the colloquy program is one way to increase the percentage of Rostered workers. He asked that we continue to encourage our youth to consider a vocation as a rostered LCMS teacher.

22. CONVENTION BUSINESS

President Lange returned to the podium to introduce the video "Growing Ministries" which will serve as an introduction to the next resolution #1-01 – Mission Plants

Resolution #1-01 -- The Chair of Floor Committee #1 introduced Aaron Putnam who read the resolves from Resolution #1-01 TO ESTABLISH NEW MISSIONS IN CNH

The committee moved for approval of Resolution #1-01, the motion was seconded. After discussion had concluded, the chair called for the vote by hand and voice. **The motion was approved**.

Resolution #2-02 -- Rev. Mitchell Gowen, Chair of Floor Committee #2 came to the podium. Resolution #2-02 was introduced - TO AMEND THE CNH DISTRICT ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION – The resolve section of the resolution was read. The committee moved for the adoption of Resolution #2-02, and the motion was seconded. Hearing no discussion, **the chair called for the vote by hand and voice.** *The motion was approved*.

Resolution #2-03 / #2-03a / #2-04 -- Floor Committee #2 presented three resolutions dealing with changes, additions, and updates to the CNH Bylaws

- Resolution #2-03 -- PROPOSED ADDITION TO THE CNH DISTRICT BYLAWS (District Bylaw changes necessitated by actions of Synod in Convention)
- Resolution #2-03a -- BYLAW ADDITION TO INCLUDE PROCESS FOR ELECTION OF REGIONAL VICE PRESIDENTS –
- Resolution #2-04 -- TO ACCEPT CHANGES TO CNH DISTRICT BYLAWS AS RECOMMENDED BY SYNOD AND DISTRICT COMMISSION ON CONSTITUTIONAL MATTERS

The committee moved that the three resolutions be considered together. The motion was seconded, and the Chair asked for discussion. As discussion ended the vote was called for the vote by hand and voice. **The motion was approved.**

23. CLOSING DEVOTION

Rev. Jason Bredesen was welcomed to the podium to offer the closing devotion. Jason commented on the confusion by some in the world today regarding the human body. His response to that was simply, "God created it – We broke it"! Christ's body was broken for us. In His body, He comes to us in the broken bread and poured out wine. Jason ended with words from 1st Corinthians -- We are the body of Christ – "Be steadfast knowing that your work is not in vain".

24. DISMISSAL TO REGIONAL CAUCUS

President Lange called the session to a close at 5:00 pm and released the delegates to their respective Regional Caucus.

4. CONVENTION ESSAYIST: REV. DR. MICHAEL NEWMAN

Rev. Dr. Michael Newman serves as the President of the Texas District of the LCMS. Rev. Newman began with prayer.

In good Lutheran fashion, the speaker asked, "What does this mean"? And "How is it done"? He noted that had been reading the book, "The Romance of Lutheranism in California" which chronicles the path of the LCMS coming to California. It seems that the journey may have begun with a letter from a woman named Elizabeth Schriever that was written to C.F. W. Walther pleading with him to send missionaries to California to support members of the Synod that had moved West. Others made similar requests and

soon the Gospel DNA welled up in the Synod and in 1852 the LCMS voted to send missionaries to California. We are called by love! In the first 70 years, the LCMS grew to over 4000 churches.

Dr. Newman has written a number of books including, "Gospel DNA: Five Markers of a Flourishing Church". He used the "Five Markers of Gospel DNA" described in that book as an outline for his essay.

- 1. People
- 2. Multiplication
- 3. Truth
- 4. Adaptability
- 5. Self-Sacrifice

President Newman closed by asking, "Do you know the LCMS? – Will you be the LCMS?" He then offered a series of questions for the attendees to discuss at their tables. This was followed by a period of Q & A.

5. CONVENTION BUSINESS

Resolution #1-02 -- Rev. Jim Beyer, Chair for Floor Committee #1 came forward to present Resolution #1-02 -- CHURCH WORKER HOUSING -- TO SEEK SOLUTIONS FOR THE CHURCH WORKER HOUSING CHALLENGE

In discussion, it was recommended that the committee consider the requirement for congregations to issue an IRS1099 form to pastors for the value of a parsonage. The committee moved for the adoption of the Resolution. The motion was seconded. After a period of discussion which was both Pro and Con, the Chair called for an electronic vote. The result was – Yes=72 – No=21 – Abstained=13 **Resolution #3-02 was adopted**

Resolution #3-04 – Floor Committee #3-member Rev. Brian Cummins presented Resolution #3-04 -- TO ADDRESS THE LUTHERAN TEACHER SHORTAGE AND LOW TEACHER SALARIES BY INITIATING A STUDENT DEBT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM FOR LCMS COMMISSIONED MINISTER-TEACHER

The committee moved for the adoption of Resolution #3-04. The motion was seconded. After a call for discussion, the Chair called for a hand and voice vote. **Resolution #3-04 was adopted**

Resolution #3-05 – Rev. Cummins remained at the podium to put before the convention Resolution #3-05 -- TO RECONSIDER THE USE OF LICENSED LAY DEACONS IN WORD AND SACRAMENT MINISTRY

The committee moved for the adoption of Resolution #3-05. The motion received a second. The Chair called for discussion which was both Pro and Con. The question was called from the floor. The motion to end the discussion was approved by a hand and voice vote. The result by electronic ballot was -- Yes=69 – No=34 -- Resolution #3-05 was adopted.

After the vote was announced, President Harrison spoke to the convention to offer some of Synod's actions regarding the LLD Program.

6. THE GREAT SENDING - AN INTRODUCTION

A video was shown regarding the Strategic Ministry Plan.

Following the video, President Lange introduced the book *The Great Sending – God's Heart for the World Beating Through You* by Will Sohns. The book was made available to all lay delegates at the convention, pastors received the book at the last Pastors Conference. Mike highly recommended the book for all congregations. The district has provided over 300 copies of the book.

7. CONVENTION BUSINESS - FINAL

Resolution #1-04 – The resolves were read from Resolution #1-04 -- REGARDING THE MISSION TRAINING CENTER

The committee moved for the adoption of Resolution #1-04. The motion was seconded. In discussion, the word "primary" was requested to be taken out of the first resolve. ARTICLE I MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District is to challenge and assist congregations in their proclamation of the Gospel and ministry to all people.

ARTICLE II RELATIONSHIP TO THE SYNOD

The Constitution and Bylaws of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod are also the Constitution and Bylaws of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District of the same. The Constitution of the Synod is also the constitution of the California-Nevada-Hawaii District. The Bylaws of the Synod shall be primarily the bylaws of the District. Both the Bylaws of the Synod and those of the District serve the Gospel mission and ministry of the Lord.

ARTICLE III STRUCTURE OF THE DISTRICT

III.A. The Board of Directors

- 1. The District Board of Directors shall be comprised of 12 members: The First Vice President of the District, who shall serve as Chair of the Board, five Regional Vice Presidents, five Regional Directors, and one Director-Commissioned Minister. The Board will conduct regular meetings at least quarterly. The Board may also meet at other times for purposes consistent with the Bylaws at the call of the District President, the First Vice President, or any five members of the Board of Directors. Seven members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum. In the event of the absence of the First Vice President, the quorum present shall elect a regional Vice President to serve as Chair Pro Tem. (The District President, the District Secretary, and the District Treasurer shall attend all regular meetings of the Board of Directors.)
- 2. Subject to limitations set forth in the Articles of Incorporation, these Bylaws, the <u>Handbook</u>, <u>Constitution and Bylaws</u> of the Synod, and the statutes of the states in which the District operates, <u>with regard to which the District intends to retain all authority and autonomy allowed a church under the laws and Constitution of the United States and the states in which the District operates. <u>Aall corporate powers</u> shall be exercised by or under the authority of the Board of Directors.</u>
- 3. The District Board of Directors shall:

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- a. As a primary function, generate and adopt declarations of desired outcomes which will give long-term direction to the District and its President, staff, and committees.
- b. In addition to generating and adopting declarations of desired outcomes, address broad levels of issues in policies of purpose and governance or constraints, leaving lesser levels to the discretion of the District President.
- c. Through the District President, and he through his staff and the District Committees, coordinate the work of the District in accordance with the District Mission Statement, the Bylaws of the Synod, the Bylaws of the District, the District Convention Resolutions, and the declarations of desired outcomes.
- d. Except for assignments of its own work (policies) to committees, consultants, or officers, delegate authority only to the District President.
- e. Provide for an annual audit of the records of the District in such manner directed by the Synod and in accordance with its own policies.
- f. Provide for and oversee the bonding of all District fiscal officers and employees entrusted with the receiving and disbursing of funds, such bonds to be provided by a licensed bonding agency at District expense.
- g. Be empowered to review all activities of the District and its committees, and make binding decisions affecting them; this review may include, but is not limited to, the leadership, membership, purpose, or functions of any activity or Committee.
- h. Approve or disapprove the annual District Budget which the District President shall present.
- i. Be the authority to create and abolish Called positions and act as the Calling body on behalf of the District. The administrative details, including preparation of Call documents, may be delegated to the District President.
- j. Respond in a timely manner to any formal concern <u>related to the Board's area of responsibility</u> addressed to it by the President, Board members, committees authorized by the Bylaws or the Board, Circuit Forums, Circuit Pastors' Conferences, or Congregations of the District or organizations that are ancillary to the District or Synod..
- k. Appoint District Reconcilers as prescribed in the Synod Constitution and Bylaws *Handbook*.
- 1. Be the custodian of all property, records, and legacies of the District.
- m. Establish and provide for the maintenance of a headquarters called the District Office, which shall be the official address of the District. All official records of the District shall be kept at the District Office; any exceptions shall require approval of the Board of Directors.
- n. Present reports of its actions at all District Conventions and, if desired, propose recommendations for consideration by the District Convention.
- o. Be responsible to the District for its actions and the actions of all District Officers, Committees, agents, and employees.
- 4. Members of the Board of Directors shall not serve as Chairs of District Committees; nor serve as members of the Nominating Committee; nor be on the District payroll.

- g. Perform such other duties as the president or the Board of Directors may assign.

III.G. District Treasurer

The Treasurer shall:

- a. Be a lay person.
- b. Be a member of a District congregation.
- c. Administer the office in accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by the District Board of Directors.
- d. Ensure that the District President keeps an accurate account of and disburses District funds according to instructions of the Board of Directors.
- e. Attend all regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors to monitor the financial health of the District and to provide counsel to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE IV THE DISTRICT COMMITTEES

IV.A. In General

- 1. District Committees shall:
 - a. Act on their own initiative within their approved budget limitations, and in accordance with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod, the Bylaws of the District, Resolutions of the Convention, and policies which have been adopted by the District Board of Directors.
 - b. On a timely basis submit to the District President and Board of Directors: proposed Plans of Action; projected costs; projected activities; lists of members; and minutes of meetings.

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- c. Determine their own need for professional staff support, such support to be provided as set forth in III.B.2.h above.
- 2. Committee Chairs shall:
 - a. Report directly to the District President, who is responsible for her/his proper functioning.
 - b. Annually provide the District President and Board of Directors with a comprehensive, written description of the progress of the Committee's programs.
 - c. Prepare a comprehensive, written report for submission to the regular District Convention.
 - d. Attend regular and special meetings of the Board of Directors, as required below (Article IV. B & C.).

IV.B. Representation at Board of Directors Meetings

- 1. Any Committee Chair may attend any regular meeting of the Board of Directors.
- 2. Any Committee Chair may be required by the District President or the Board of Directors to attend any regular or special meeting of the Board of Directors.
- 3. Although Committee Chairs answer directly to the District President, they attend Board of Directors meetings to report and to give and receive counsel.

IV.C. Mandated Committees

1. MISSION

- a. This Committee is responsible for coordinating and promoting the mission plans of the District and supporting and encouraging the mission work of every congregation.
- <u>b.</u> This Committee shall operate according to the CNH District Mission Agency policies and procedures as adopted by the Board of Directors.

b.c. This Committee' shall coordinate with the Office of National Mission and, if applicable, the Office of International Mission.

2. HUMAN CARE MINISTRIES

- a. The Chair of this Committee may attend all regular meetings of the Board of Directors and any special meetings, or when required by the District President or the Board of Directors.
- b. This Committee shall:
- i. Provide liaison for the Synod's Board for Office of National Missions.
- ii. Provide Circuit level assistance in the field of social welfare, especially in coordinating Circuit support for District-wide social welfare projects.
- iii. Be responsible for giving guidance to the District in the area of social ministry.

IV.D. Special Committees

The District President may, by and with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors, create ad hoc Committees as needed. These Committees and their Chairs have the same rights, privileges and accountability as the Mandated Committees.

ARTICLE V DISTRICT CONVENTIONS

The District shall meet in Convention triennially prior to June 1 of the year preceding the Convention of the Synod. In addition to provisions of the Synod <u>Handbook</u> Constitution and Bylaws regarding Conventions of the District, the following regulations shall apply:

V.A. Delegates

Congregations shall register the names (together with a brief biographical sketch) of the delegates and alternates with the District President at least three months prior to the opening of the Convention.

V.B. Committee Appointments

The District President shall announce the appointment of Convention Floor Committees in the pages of the official District publication at least one month prior to the opening of the Convention.

V.C. Convention Manual

- 1. The Board of Directors and all Committees of the District, as well as others desiring to bring their work to the attention of the District Convention, shall submit their reports and recommendations to the District President for publication in the Convention Manual Workbook. These reports and recommendations shall be in the office of the District President at least ten weeks prior to the opening of the Convention. The District President, at his discretion, shall have the right to withhold certain overtures and unofficial reports from publication in the Convention Manual Workbook, referring them directly to the appropriate Floor Committee as unpublished overtures and reports for its consideration. Overtures and unofficial reports received later than two weeks prior to the opening of the Convention may be referred to the Convention at the discretion of the District President.
- 2. One copy of the *Convention Manual* shall be supplied to each Minister of Religion Ordained or Commissioned, to each congregation on the District roster, and to such others as the Board of Directors shall authorize.
- 3. The District President shall instruct the District Secretary to publish all the reports and overtures which he supplies, together with the program of the Convention, an outline of the Convention essay, and the District roster (this roster to include all congregations, all Ministers of religion Ordained and Commissioned, all officers and Committees of the District and of the Convention). The Convention Manual Workbook shall be mailed in time to reach the congregations at least one month prior to the opening of the District Convention.

V.D. Convention Business

1. All reports, resolutions, including those from Floor Committees, or other material not contained in the *Convention Manual* shall be reproduced and distributed to the delegates prior to the opening of the session in which these reports, resolutions, or other materials are to be discussed and considered.

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2. Except for overtures, memorials, petitions, or resolutions, no materials appearing in the published *Convention Manual* shall be read in their entirety on the Convention floor.

V.E. Proceedings

- 1. The Secretary shall be responsible for publication of the *District Convention Proceedings* by July 1 following the Convention.
- 2. One copy of the *Proceedings* shall be supplied to each minister of Religion Ordained or Commissioned, each congregation on the District roster, and such others as the Board of Directors shall authorize.

ARTICLE VI NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

VI.A. Elected Officers

The elected officers of the District are President, First Vice President, five Regional Vice Presidents, five Regional Directors, Secretary, Treasurer, members of the Nominating Committee, and a Circuit Visitor for each of the District's Circuits.

VI.B. Term of Elected Officers

- 1. The term of office for all officers of the District shall be for three years.
- 2. The term of office for the President, First Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Circuit Visitors shall be without limitation to reelection. All other positions shall have a limitation of two successive terms. One-half or more More than one-half of a term shall be considered a full term under limited tenure.

VI.C. Pre-Convention Nominations for District President and First Vice-President

Nominations for the Offices of President and First Vice-President shall be made in the following manner:

- a. The Secretary of the District shall mail nominating ballots to each voting congregation no later than eight (8) months prior to the Convention.
- b. Each voting congregation of the District is entitled to nominate two Ministers of Religion Ordained from the roster of the Synod as candidates for the office of District President and two Ministers of Religion Ordained from the roster of the <u>Synod District</u> as candidates for the office of First Vice-President.
- c. Each nominating ballot shall be signed by two officers of the voting congregation and shall be returned to the Secretary of the District no later than six months prior to the opening date of the Convention.
- d. The Secretary of the District shall tabulate nominations and report the names of all clergy receiving three or more nominations in the *Convention Manual*.
- e. Candidates for President shall be the five receiving the highest number of nominating ballots from the congregations. In the event of a tie for the fifth position among the candidates, all names involved

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in the tie shall be listed as candidates, as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws Handbook. 10

f. Candidates for First Vice-President shall be the five receiving the highest number of nominating ballots from the congregations. In the event of a tie for the fifth position among the candidates, all names involved in the tie shall be listed as candidates, as prescribed by the Synod *Handbook*. 16

VI.D. Convention Floor Nominations

Except for the Offices of President and First Vice-President, additional nominations for any elective office may be made from the floor of the Convention, from the floor of the Caucus as appropriate, or by any voting delegate; however, the prior consent of the nominee shall have been obtained and a brief biographical sketch submitted to the District Secretary at the time the nomination is made.

VI.E. Teller Committee

A Teller Committee and its Chair shall be appointed by the District President to facilitate the election of officers.

VI.F. Order of Elections

- 1. Election of the President
 - a. In the first business of the session of the Convention, the Teller Committee shall conduct the election for the office of President.
 - b. Each voting delegate shall be entitled to vote for one of the candidates for President, whose names appear on the slate published by the District Secretary.
 - c. The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared President.
 - d. If additional balloting is necessary, the candidate receiving the smallest number of votes shall be eliminated on each subsequent ballot until one candidate receives a majority of the votes cast. In the event of ties for the smallest number, all those tied shall be eliminated.
- 2. Election of the First Vice President
 - a. In the first business session of the

Convention, the Teller Committee shall conduct the election for the office of First Vice President.

- b. Each voting delegate shall be entitled to vote for one of the candidates for First Vice President, whose names appear on the slate published by the District Secretary.
- c. The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared First Vice President.
- d. If additional balloting is necessary, the candidate receiving the smallest number of votes shall be eliminated on each subsequent ballot until one candidate receives a majority of the votes cast. In the event of ties for the smallest number, all those tied shall be eliminated.
- 3. Election of the Regional Vice Presidents and Regional Directors

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- a. The Regions shall caucus to nominate their Regional Vice Presidents and the Regional Director. Each Region will submit to the Convention one nomination for Regional Vice President and one nomination for Regional Director.
- b. In the Regional caucus, the Teller Committee will facilitate the nomination of the Regional Vice President according to the process used for nomination of First Vice President.
- c. In the Regional caucus, the Teller Committee will present the slate prepared by the Nominating Committee for the office of Regional Director; entertain nominations from the floor of the caucus as allowed in Article *VI.D* above. <u>Upon closure of the slate</u>, the caucus shall by ballot select its candidate. The Candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared nominated.
- d. The Teller Committee shall submit to the Convention a final slate of candidates for the offices of Regional Vice President and Regional Director to be ratified by the Convention.
- e. The Teller Committee shall conduct the election (ratification) of the Regional Vice Presidents and Regional Directors.
- 4. Succeeding elections shall be conducted by the Teller Committee for the following offices:
 - a. For the Director-Commissioned Minister, for the Secretary, and for the Treasurer from the slate prepared by the Nominating Committee, supplemented by nominations from the floor. The candidate receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected.
 - b. For the (next Convention) Nominating Committee from the slate prepared by the Nominating Committee, supplemented by nominations from the floor. The candidates receiving a majority of the votes cast shall be declared elected.
 - c. For Circuit Visitors from the slate published by the District Secretary, as prescribed by the Synod $\mathit{Handbook}$. 11

VI.G. Ballots

On all ballots, candidates shall be listed in alphabetical order. There shall be no indication of incumbency by special mark.

VI.H Records of Elections

All ballots in each election shall be preserved by the Chair of the Teller Committee until the close of the Convention and shall then be destroyed, as prescribed by the Synod Constitution and Bylaws Handbook. 12

VI.I. Vacancies

- 1. When the Office of President becomes vacant, or when the President is incapacitated, the Office shall be assumed by the First Vice President. If less than six months of the term remains, he may serve out the term in a part-time capacity. If more than six months remains, he must be willing to assume the position full-time. If he declines, a new President shall be elected by the Board of Directors.
- 2. When the office of First Vice President becomes vacant, a new First Vice President shall be elected by the Board of Directors.

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3. Vacancies in any other elected office of the District shall be filled by Presidential appointment by and with the advice and consent of the Board of Directors. In the event any officer of the District shall become incapable of service, the Board of Directors shall relieve that person of his/her duties.

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ARTICLE VIII AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS

VIII.A. Amendments by Direct Convention Action

Amendments to these Bylaws may be made by the District Convention provided:

- a. The change is not contrary to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Synod.
- b. The proposed change is presented to the Convention in writing.
- c. The proposed material is specified as a Bylaw amendment and is studied as such by a Convention floor committee.
- d. The change is adopted by a majority vote by the Convention.

VIII.B. Amendment by Indirect Convention Action

- 1. Amendments to these Bylaws shall be made when the District Convention shall have created new entities without having established Bylaw provisions for them or when District Convention action affecting these Bylaws has been taken without providing the necessary new texts.
- 2. Needed revisions to these Bylaws shall be drafted by the District Constitutional Matters Committee and submitted to the next District Convention for approval.

VIII. C. Amendment by Synod Action

- 1. Amendments to these Bylaws shall be made when action taken by the Synod's Convention shall have set them at variance with the Synod's Constitution and Bylaws.
- 2. Needed revisions to these Bylaws shall be drafted by the District Committee on Constitutional Matters and submitted to the next District Convention for approval.

When necessitated by amendments to the Synod Constitution or Bylaws or otherwise expressly directed by a resolution of the Synod in convention, amendments may be made by a two-thirds majority of the District Board of Directors. Such amendments shall be drafted by the District Secretary and shall be reviewed in advance by the LCMS Commission on Constitutional Matters.

VIII.D. Publication of Bylaw Revisions

Whenever it becomes necessary to publish new editions of the Bylaws of the District (whether entirely or in substantial sections), the Secretary shall have responsibility for their publication.
